The Notes-Bibliography System: Citing Newspapers

The Notes-Bibliography system is widely used in the humanities and is the primary system detailed in *The Chicago Manual of Style*. For newspaper articles, this system requires detailed notes and a comprehensive bibliography.

Footnotes and Endnotes for Newspapers

In this system, the first time a source is cited, a full note is provided. Subsequent citations of the same source can be shortened. A bibliography entry is also required, listing all consulted sources alphabetically by author's last name or by title if no author is listed.

First Note Example (Print Newspaper Article):

For a print newspaper article, the first note typically includes the author's full name, the title of the article in quotation marks, the name of the newspaper (italicized), the date of publication, and the page number(s).

- Author's First Name Last Name, "Title of Article," *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year, Page Number(s).

For example:

1. Sarah Johnson, "City Council Approves New Park Development," *Chicago Tribune*, October 26, 2023, A1.

Subsequent Note Example (Print Newspaper Article):

If you cite the same article again, you can use a shortened note format. This includes the author's last name, a shortened title (if necessary to distinguish from other works by the same author), and the page number.

- Author's Last Name, "Shortened Title," Page Number.

For example:

5. Johnson, "City Council," A3.

Bibliography Entry for Newspapers

The bibliography entry for a newspaper article mirrors the full note but omits page numbers (unless it's an editorial or a letter to the editor, where page numbers are often included) and uses a slightly different format, typically with the author's last name first.

- Author's Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year.

For example:

Johnson, Sarah. "City Council Approves New Park Development." *Chicago Tribune*, October 26, 2023.

The Author-Date System: Citing Newspapers

The Author-Date system, while less common for humanities research that heavily relies on newspapers, is an alternative within Chicago style. It uses parenthetical in-text citations and a reference list.

In-Text Citations for Newspapers

In-text citations typically include the author's last name and the year of publication. If necessary to distinguish between multiple works by the same author from the same year, a letter is appended to the year.

For example:

(Johnson 2023)

If a specific page is referenced, it can be included:

(Johnson 2023, A1)

Reference List for Newspapers

The reference list includes all sources cited in the text, alphabetized by author's last name. The format for newspaper articles is similar to the bibliography in the Notes-Bibliography system, but the date comes after the newspaper name and is enclosed in parentheses.

- Author's Last Name, First Name. Year. "Title of Article." *Newspaper Name*, Month Day.

For example:

Key Elements in Newspaper Citations

Regardless of which Chicago citation system you employ, certain core elements are crucial for accurately citing newspaper articles. Ensuring these are present and correctly formatted will significantly improve the clarity and credibility of your work.

Author

The author's name is the primary identifier. If an article has a byline, use that author's name. Online Newspaper Articles

- **Reference List:** Smith, John. 2023. "New Discoveries in Space Exploration." *The New York Times*, November 15. Accessed November 20, 2023. <https://www.nytimes.com/article/space-exploration>.

Editorials and Opinion Pieces

Editorials and opinion pieces are often clearly marked. They should be cited similarly to news articles, but the type of content (editorial, opinion) can sometimes be noted, especially if it's crucial for context.

- **Notes-Bibliography:** Author's First Name Last Name, "Title of Editorial/Opinion," *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year.
- **Example:** Maria Garcia, "The Case for Renewable Energy," *The Wall Street Journal*, October 27, 2023.
- **Bibliography:** Garcia, Maria. "The Case for Renewable Energy." *The Wall Street Journal*, October 27, 2023.

If the editorial is unsigned (e.g., "The Editors"), you would start with the title, and then the newspaper name. In the bibliography, it would be alphabetized under "T" for "The."

Articles with Multiple Authors

When an article has more than one author, the convention is to list the first author in the citation, followed by "and" and the second author's name. For three or more authors, you can list the first author followed by "et al." in the notes and bibliography/reference list, though some styles may prefer listing all authors in the bibliography.

- **Notes-Bibliography (Two Authors):** Author One First Name Last Name and Author Two First Name Last Name, "Title of Article," *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year, Page Number.
- **Notes-Bibliography (Three or More Authors):** Author One First Name Last Name et al., "Title of Article," *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year, Page Number.

Newspapers Without Authors

If a newspaper article lacks an author byline, the citation begins with the title of the article. In the Notes-Bibliography system, the article title comes first in the note and bibliography entry, and the newspaper name follows. In the Author-Date system, the title heads the reference list entry.

- **Notes-Bibliography:** "Title of Article," *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year, Page Number.

Newspapers with Special Sections

Some newspapers have specific sections (e.g., Business, Sports, Arts). While not always mandatory in basic citations, including the section letter or name can be helpful for clarity, especially if the page numbers are not unique across sections.

- **Notes-Bibliography:** Author's First Name Last Name, "Title of Article," *Newspaper Name*, Section Letter/Name, Month Day, Year, Page Number.
- **Example:** David Lee, "Tech Innovations Highlighted," *Financial Times*, Business,
