the end of the chapter or document) is generated. These notes typically include abbreviated citation information, with the first full citation of a source appearing in the bibliography at the end of the work. Subsequent citations in the notes can be shortened.

The bibliography itself is a comprehensive list of all sources that were cited in the notes. It is arranged alphabetically by the author's last name. The primary purpose of the bibliography is to offer a complete overview of the research undertaken, allowing readers to easily find the full bibliographic details of any source mentioned in the notes. This system emphasizes the author's narrative and scholarly argument while meticulously attributing all borrowed material.

The Author-Date System

- Author's name(s)

Author's Name

The author's name is typically the first element in a bibliography entry. For the notes-bibliography system, the last name comes first, followed by a comma, then the first name and any middle names

or initials. For example: Smith, John D. If there are multiple authors, the first author's name is inverted, but subsequent authors' names are listed in normal order (first name first). For the author-date system, the order is the same: Last Name, First Name.

Title of the Work

The title of the work being cited is usually italicized if it is a standalone work, such as a book or a website. If it is a part of a larger work, such as an article in a journal or a chapter in a book, the title is typically enclosed in quotation marks. Proper capitalization rules, following CMOS guidelines, should be applied to the title.

Publication Information

This includes the place of publication (city), the publisher's name, and the year the work was published. For books, this information is crucial for identification. For electronic sources, publication details might be less extensive, but include information like the name of the website or the organization responsible for its content, along with the date of publication or last revision, if available.

Edited Book

For an edited book, the editor(s) are listed, often with "ed." or "eds." following their names. The title of the book is italicized, and the publication details follow as usual.

Chen, Li, ed. *Essays on Modern Literature*. London: Oxford University Press, 2019.

Author-Date System Example:

When a journal article has a Digital Object Identifier (DOI), it should be included in the citation. This provides a stable link to the article online.

Chicago Manual of Style Bibliography Examples: Websites

Citing online sources requires careful attention to detail, as information can be less structured than in print. CMOS provides guidelines for website citations that include the author (if available), the title of the page or article, the name of the website, and the URL, along with the date of access or publication.

Web Page with Author

If an author is listed for the web page, their name is included. The title of the page is enclosed in quotation marks, and the website name is italicized. The URL and date of access are essential.

Formatting Specific Elements in Bibliography Entries
