THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE (CMOS) IS A COMPREHENSIVE GUIDE FOR WRITING, EDITING, AND CITATION THAT IS WIDELY USED IN ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL WRITING. WHEN IT COMES TO CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES, THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE OFFERS CLEAR GUIDELINES FOR BOTH FOOTNOTE/ENDNOTE AND AUTHOR-DATE CITATION SYSTEMS, ENSURING CONSISTENCY AND CLARITY FOR READERS. THIS ARTICLE WILL DELVE INTO THE INTRICACIES OF PROPERLY CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES ACCORDING TO CMOS, COVERING THE ESSENTIAL COMPONENTS OF A CITATION, VARIATIONS FOR DIFFERENT PUBLICATION TYPES, AND THE NUANCES OF IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND BIBLIOGRAPHIES. MASTERING THESE ELEMENTS IS CRUCIAL FOR ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND FOR EFFECTIVELY COMMUNICATING YOUR RESEARCH SOURCES.

UNDERSTANDING THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES PROVIDES A ROBUST FRAMEWORK FOR ACADEMIC AND SCHOLARLY COMMUNICATION. IT AIMS TO EQUIP WRITERS WITH THE TOOLS TO CLEARLY AND ACCURATELY ATTRIBUTE THEIR SOURCES, THEREBY UPHOLDING ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND ENABLING READERS TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL WORKS. THE CMOS OFFERS TWO PRIMARY CITATION SYSTEMS: THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM AND THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM. BOTH SYSTEMS ARE DESIGNED TO BE THOROUGH, BUT THEY DIFFER IN THEIR PRESENTATION AND APPLICATION WITHIN A DOCUMENT. THIS ARTICLE WILL EXPLORE THESE SYSTEMS IN DETAIL, FOCUSING SPECIFICALLY ON HOW TO CITE JOURNAL ARTICLES, A COMMON AND VITAL SOURCE TYPE IN SCHOLARLY RESEARCH.

NAVIGATING THE COMPLEXITIES OF SCHOLARLY CITATION CAN BE DAUNTING, BUT BY UNDERSTANDING THE FOUNDATIONAL PRINCIPLES OF THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE, WRITERS CAN DEVELOP A CONFIDENT APPROACH TO REFERENCING JOURNAL ARTICLES. WHETHER YOU ARE WORKING ON A HISTORY PAPER, A SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH ARTICLE, OR A HUMANITIES ESSAY, ADHERING TO CMOS GUIDELINES FOR JOURNAL CITATIONS WILL ENHANCE THE CREDIBILITY AND PROFESSIONALISM OF YOUR WORK. WE WILL BREAK DOWN THE ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF A CITATION, EXPLORE COMMON VARIATIONS, AND OFFER PRACTICAL ADVICE TO HELP YOU AVOID FREQUENT ERRORS.

CORE COMPONENTS OF A JOURNAL ARTICLE CITATION IN CMOS

REGARDLESS OF THE CITATION SYSTEM EMPLOYED (NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY OR AUTHOR-DATE), A COMPLETE CITATION FOR A

JOURNAL ARTICLE IN THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE TYPICALLY INCLUDES SEVERAL KEY PIECES OF INFORMATION. THESE COMPONENTS WORK TOGETHER TO UNIQUELY IDENTIFY THE SOURCE AND ALLOW A READER TO FIND IT. UNDERSTANDING EACH PART IS FUNDAMENTAL TO CONSTRUCTING ACCURATE CITATIONS, WHETHER IN FOOTNOTES, ENDNOTES, OR BIBLIOGRAPHIES.

ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS FOR JOURNAL ARTICLE CITATIONS

WHEN CITING A JOURNAL ARTICLE USING THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE, SEVERAL CORE PIECES OF INFORMATION ARE INDISPENSABLE. THESE ELEMENTS ARE CONSISTENT ACROSS BOTH MAJOR CITATION SYSTEMS BUT ARE ARRANGED DIFFERENTLY.

- AUTHOR(S) NAME(S): THE FULL NAME(S) OF THE AUTHOR(S) AS THEY APPEAR ON THE ARTICLE.
- ARTICLE TITLE: THE COMPLETE TITLE OF THE JOURNAL ARTICLE.
- JOURNAL TITLE: THE FULL TITLE OF THE JOURNAL IN WHICH THE ARTICLE WAS PUBLISHED.
- VOLUME NUMBER: THE SPECIFIC VOLUME OF THE JOURNAL.
- ISSUE NUMBER: THE SPECIFIC ISSUE WITHIN THE VOLUME, IF APPLICABLE.
- PUBLICATION DATE: THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION, AND SOMETIMES THE MONTH OR SEASON FOR CERTAIN JOURNALS.
- PAGE NUMBERS: THE SPECIFIC PAGE RANGE WHERE THE ARTICLE APPEARS IN THE JOURNAL.
- DOI (DIGITAL OBJECT IDENTIFIER): IF AVAILABLE, THE DOI IS A PERSISTENT LINK TO THE ARTICLE, ESPECIALLY CRUCIAL FOR ONLINE SOURCES.

THE FOOTNOTE/ENDNOTE SYSTEM FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES

THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, OFTEN REFERRED TO AS THE FOOTNOTE OR ENDNOTE SYSTEM, IS WIDELY FAVORED IN FIELDS LIKE HISTORY, LITERATURE, AND THE ARTS. THIS SYSTEM USES NUMBERED NOTES, EITHER AT THE BOTTOM OF THE PAGE (FOOTNOTES) OR AT THE END OF THE DOCUMENT (ENDNOTES), TO CITE SOURCES. THE CORRESPONDING BIBLIOGRAPHY AT THE END OF THE WORK PROVIDES A COMPLETE LIST OF ALL SOURCES CONSULTED.

IN-TEXT FOOTNOTES

IN-TEXT CITATIONS IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM ARE INDICATED BY SUPERScript ARABIC NUMERALS PLACED AT THE END OF A SENTENCE OR CLAUSE, IMMEDIATELY AFTER PUNCTUATION. THESE NUMERALS CORRESPOND TO A NUMBERED NOTE CONTAINING THE CITATION DETAILS. WHEN YOU FIRST CITE A SOURCE, THE NOTE PROVIDES FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION. SUBSEQUENT CITATIONS OF THE SAME SOURCE USE A SHORTENED FORM.

FULL NOTE

THE INITIAL NOTE FOR A JOURNAL ARTICLE IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM SHOULD INCLUDE ALL NECESSARY BIBLIOGRAPHIC DETAILS. THE FORMAT FOR A JOURNAL ARTICLE IN A FULL NOTE TYPICALLY FOLLOWS THIS STRUCTURE: AUTHOR FIRST NAME LAST NAME, "ARTICLE TITLE," JOURNAL TITLE VOLUME, no. ISSUE (PUBLICATION YEAR): PAGE NUMBER(S). FOR EXAMPLE: JANE DOE, "THE IMPACT OF SOCIAL MEDIA ON POLITICAL DISCOURSE," JOURNAL OF COMMUNICATION STUDIES 25, no. 3 (2022): 45-67.

SUBSEQUENT NOTE

FOR ANY SUBSEQUENT CITATIONS OF THE SAME JOURNAL ARTICLE WITHIN THE SAME DOCUMENT, A SHORTENED NOTE FORMAT IS USED. THIS SAVES SPACE AND AVOIDS REPETITION WHILE STILL CLEARLY IDENTIFYING THE SOURCE. THE SHORTENED NOTE USUALLY INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, A SHORTENED VERSION OF THE ARTICLE TITLE (IF NEEDED FOR CLARITY WHEN CITING MULTIPLE WORKS BY THE SAME AUTHOR), AND THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER(S) BEING REFERENCED. FOR INSTANCE: DOE, "SOCIAL MEDIA," 52.

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, COMMONLY USED IN SOCIAL SCIENCES AND SOME NATURAL SCIENCES, PRESENTS IN-TEXT CITATIONS AS PARENTHETICAL REFERENCES CONSISTING OF THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE PUBLICATION YEAR. A COMPREHENSIVE BIBLIOGRAPHY LISTING ALL CITED SOURCES IS PROVIDED AT THE END OF THE DOCUMENT.

IN-TEXT CITATIONS

IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, AN IN-TEXT CITATION APPEARS WITHIN THE BODY OF YOUR TEXT, ENCLOSED IN PARENTHESES. IT TYPICALLY INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION. IF YOU ARE REFERRING TO A SPECIFIC PART OF THE ARTICLE, YOU MAY ALSO INCLUDE THE PAGE NUMBER. FOR EXAMPLE: (DOE 2022) OR (DOE 2022, 45). THIS SYSTEM ALLOWS READERS TO QUICKLY SEE THE SOURCE AND ITS PUBLICATION DATE, AIDING THEM IN CONTEXTUALIZING THE INFORMATION PRESENTED.

BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY SECTION IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM PROVIDES A COMPLETE ALPHABETICAL LISTING OF ALL SOURCES CITED IN THE DOCUMENT. THE FORMAT FOR A JOURNAL ARTICLE IN A BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY IS GENERALLY: AUTHOR LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. "ARTICLE TITLE." JOURNAL TITLE VOLUME (ISSUE): PAGE NUMBERS. IF A DOI IS AVAILABLE, IT SHOULD BE INCLUDED. FOR EXAMPLE: DOE, JANE. 2022. "THE IMPACT OF SOCIAL MEDIA ON POLITICAL DISCOURSE." JOURNAL OF COMMUNICATION STUDIES 25 (3): 45-67. doi:10.1000/jcs.2022.0001.

SPECIFIC SCENARIOS IN CHICAGO STYLE JOURNAL ARTICLE CITATION

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES ADDRESSES A VARIETY OF SITUATIONS THAT DEVIATE FROM THE STANDARD FORMAT, ENSURING COMPREHENSIVE GUIDANCE FOR WRITERS. THESE SPECIFIC SCENARIOS OFTEN ARISE WITH ARTICLES THAT HAVE MULTIPLE AUTHORS, LACK A CLEAR AUTHOR, OR ARE ACCESSED THROUGH DIGITAL MEANS.

JOURNAL ARTICLES WITH MULTIPLE AUTHORS

WHEN A JOURNAL ARTICLE HAS TWO OR THREE AUTHORS, ALL AUTHORS' NAMES ARE INCLUDED IN THE CITATION. FOR WORKS WITH FOUR OR MORE AUTHORS, CHICAGO STYLE TYPICALLY LISTS THE FIRST AUTHOR'S NAME FOLLOWED BY "ET AL." IN THE NOTES, BUT INCLUDES ALL AUTHORS IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY. HOWEVER, RECENT EDITIONS OF CMOS OFFER FLEXIBILITY, ALLOWING FOR "ET AL." IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY AS WELL, IF DESIRED FOR BREVITY. ALWAYS CONSULT THE LATEST EDITION OF THE MANUAL FOR THE MOST CURRENT RECOMMENDATIONS.

- NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY (FOR THREE AUTHORS): FIRST NAME LAST NAME, FIRST NAME LAST NAME, AND FIRST NAME LAST NAME, "ARTICLE TITLE," JOURNAL TITLE VOLUME, no. ISSUE (YEAR): PAGE(S).
- NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY (FOR FOUR OR MORE AUTHORS, FIRST NOTE): FIRST NAME LAST NAME ET AL., "ARTICLE TITLE," JOURNAL TITLE VOLUME, no. ISSUE (YEAR): PAGE(S).

- AUTHOR-DATE (FOR THREE AUTHORS): LAST NAME, FIRST NAME, FIRST NAME LAST NAME, AND FIRST NAME LAST NAME. YEAR. "ARTICLE TITLE." JOURNAL TITLE VOLUME (ISSUE): PAGE(S).
- AUTHOR-DATE (FOR FOUR OR MORE AUTHORS): LAST NAME, FIRST NAME, ET AL. YEAR. "ARTICLE TITLE." JOURNAL TITLE VOLUME (ISSUE): PAGE(S).

JOURNAL ARTICLES WITH NO AUTHOR

IN INSTANCES WHERE A JOURNAL ARTICLE IS PUBLISHED WITHOUT A NAMED AUTHOR, THE CITATION BEGINS WITH THE TITLE OF THE ARTICLE. THIS PRINCIPLE APPLIES TO BOTH THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY AND AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEMS. THE ARTICLE TITLE THEN SERVES AS THE PRIMARY IDENTIFIER, FOLLOWED BY THE JOURNAL TITLE AND PUBLICATION DETAILS. THIS ENSURES THAT THE SOURCE IS STILL CLEARLY IDENTIFIABLE AND RETRIEVABLE.

JOURNAL ARTICLES WITH A DOI

THE DIGITAL OBJECT IDENTIFIER (DOI) IS A UNIQUE ALPHANUMERIC STRING THAT SERVES AS A PERSISTENT IDENTIFIER FOR AN ELECTRONIC DOCUMENT. INCLUDING THE DOI IN YOUR CITATION IS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED, ESPECIALLY FOR ONLINE JOURNAL ARTICLES, AS IT PROVIDES A STABLE LINK THAT IS LESS LIKELY TO BREAK THAN A URL. IN BOTH CMOS SYSTEMS, THE DOI IS TYPICALLY PLACED AT THE END OF THE CITATION, OFTEN PRECEDED BY "DOI:".

JOURNAL ARTICLES FROM ONLINE DATABASES

WHEN RETRIEVING JOURNAL ARTICLES FROM ONLINE DATABASES (LIKE JSTOR, PROJECT MUSE, OR ACADEMIC SEARCH ENGINES), YOU SHOULD GENERALLY INCLUDE THE DOI IF ONE IS PROVIDED. IF NO DOI IS AVAILABLE, YOU MAY INCLUDE THE NAME OF THE DATABASE AND A STABLE URL, BUT THE DOI IS PREFERRED FOR ITS PERSISTENCE. ENSURE THAT THE URL IS DIRECTLY LINKED TO THE ARTICLE, NOT JUST THE DATABASE HOMEPAGE.

JOURNAL ARTICLES WITH SPECIFIC SECTIONS (E.G., LETTERS TO THE EDITOR)

FOR ARTICLES THAT ARE PART OF A SPECIFIC SECTION WITHIN A JOURNAL, SUCH AS LETTERS TO THE EDITOR OR BOOK REVIEWS, YOU SHOULD CLEARLY INDICATE THIS IN YOUR CITATION. FOR LETTERS TO THE EDITOR, THE CITATION MIGHT INCLUDE THE WORD "LETTER" AFTER THE ARTICLE TITLE OR IN THE DESCRIPTION OF THE CONTENT. THIS HELPS THE READER UNDERSTAND THE NATURE OF THE SOURCE MATERIAL ACCURATELY.

COMMON PITFALLS AND BEST PRACTICES IN CMOS JOURNAL ARTICLE CITATION

ADHERING TO THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES REQUIRES METICULOUS ATTENTION TO DETAIL. AVOIDING COMMON ERRORS AND ADOPTING BEST PRACTICES WILL ENSURE THE ACCURACY AND CREDIBILITY OF YOUR RESEARCH. CONSISTENCY IN FORMATTING AND THOROUGH PROOFREADING ARE PARAMOUNT.

ENSURING ACCURACY IN CITATIONS

ONE OF THE MOST CRUCIAL ASPECTS OF SCHOLARLY WRITING IS THE ACCURACY OF YOUR CITATIONS. DOUBLE-CHECK ALL DETAILS AGAINST THE ORIGINAL SOURCE: AUTHOR NAMES, ARTICLE TITLES, JOURNAL TITLES, VOLUME AND ISSUE NUMBERS, PUBLICATION DATES, AND PAGE RANGES. INACCURACIES CAN LEAD TO CONFUSION FOR YOUR READERS AND MAY UNDERMINE THE PERCEIVED RELIABILITY OF YOUR WORK. ALWAYS TREAT YOUR SOURCES WITH RESPECT BY REPRESENTING THEM FAITHFULLY IN

YOUR CITATIONS.

MAINTAINING CONSISTENCY

CONSISTENCY IS A HALLMARK OF PROFESSIONAL ACADEMIC WRITING. WHETHER YOU ARE USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM OR THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, APPLY THE CHOSEN FORMAT UNIFORMLY THROUGHOUT YOUR DOCUMENT. THIS INCLUDES THE CAPITALIZATION OF TITLES, THE USE OF PUNCTUATION, AND THE PLACEMENT OF CITATION ELEMENTS. INCONSISTENT FORMATTING CAN BE DISTRACTING AND DETRACT FROM THE OVERALL CLARITY AND PROFESSIONALISM OF YOUR PAPER. IF YOU ARE UNSURE ABOUT A SPECIFIC FORMATTING RULE, REFER TO THE LATEST EDITION OF THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE.

PROOFREADING YOUR CITATIONS

AFTER YOU HAVE COMPLETED YOUR WRITING AND CITATIONS, DEDICATE TIME TO THOROUGHLY PROOFREAD YOUR FOOTNOTES, ENDNOTES, AND BIBLIOGRAPHY. LOOK FOR TYPOGRAPHICAL ERRORS, GRAMMATICAL MISTAKES, AND INCONSISTENCIES IN FORMATTING. READING YOUR CITATIONS ALOUD CAN SOMETIMES HELP YOU CATCH ERRORS THAT YOUR EYES MIGHT OTHERWISE MISS. A FINAL REVIEW BY A PEER OR COLLEAGUE CAN ALSO BE INVALUABLE IN IDENTIFYING ANY OVERSIGHTS.

MASTERING THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE FOR CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES IS AN ONGOING PROCESS THAT REWARDS DILIGENCE AND PRACTICE. BY UNDERSTANDING THE CORE COMPONENTS, DIFFERENTIATING BETWEEN THE TWO CITATION SYSTEMS, AND BEING MINDFUL OF SPECIFIC SCENARIOS AND BEST PRACTICES, WRITERS CAN CONFIDENTLY AND ACCURATELY REPRESENT THEIR SOURCES. THIS ATTENTION TO DETAIL NOT ONLY UPHOLDS ACADEMIC INTEGRITY BUT ALSO SIGNIFICANTLY ENHANCES THE CLARITY AND ACCESSIBILITY OF YOUR RESEARCH FOR YOUR AUDIENCE.

Q: WHAT IS THE FUNDAMENTAL DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY AND AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEMS IN CHICAGO STYLE FOR JOURNAL ARTICLES?

A: THE FUNDAMENTAL DIFFERENCE LIES IN THEIR PRESENTATION WITHIN THE TEXT. THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM USES NUMBERED FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES FOR CITATIONS, WITH A FULL BIBLIOGRAPHY AT THE END. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM USES PARENTHETICAL IN-TEXT CITATIONS (AUTHOR YEAR) AND A CORRESPONDING REFERENCE LIST AT THE END.

Q: HOW DO I CITE A JOURNAL ARTICLE WITH THREE AUTHORS IN A CHICAGO STYLE FOOTNOTE?

A: IN A FOOTNOTE, YOU WOULD LIST THE AUTHORS IN THE ORDER THEY APPEAR ON THE ARTICLE, WITH THE FIRST AUTHOR'S NAME IN FIRST NAME LAST NAME FORMAT, FOLLOWED BY SUBSEQUENT AUTHORS IN THE SAME FORMAT. FOR EXAMPLE: JOHN SMITH, JANE DOE, AND ROBERT JOHNSON, "AN INTERESTING STUDY," JOURNAL OF FINDINGS 10, no. 2 (2023): 115.

Q: WHAT IS THE CORRECT WAY TO FORMAT A JOURNAL ARTICLE WITH FOUR OR MORE AUTHORS IN THE AUTHOR-DATE BIBLIOGRAPHY UNDER CHICAGO STYLE?

A: IN THE AUTHOR-DATE BIBLIOGRAPHY, FOR FOUR OR MORE AUTHORS, YOU LIST THE FIRST AUTHOR'S NAME FOLLOWED BY "ET AL." FOR EXAMPLE: SMITH, JOHN, ET AL. 2023. "AN INTERESTING STUDY." JOURNAL OF FINDINGS 10 (2): 115-130.

Q: SHOULD I INCLUDE THE PAGE NUMBER IN AN IN-TEXT CITATION FOR A JOURNAL ARTICLE USING THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM?

A: INCLUDING THE PAGE NUMBER IN AN AUTHOR-DATE IN-TEXT CITATION IS OPTIONAL BUT RECOMMENDED IF YOU ARE REFERRING TO A SPECIFIC PASSAGE OR QUOTATION. THE FORMAT WOULD BE (SMITH 2023, 120).

Q: WHAT IS A DOI AND WHY IS IT IMPORTANT WHEN CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: A DOI (DIGITAL OBJECT IDENTIFIER) IS A UNIQUE, PERSISTENT IDENTIFIER FOR ELECTRONIC DOCUMENTS. IT'S CRUCIAL BECAUSE IT PROVIDES A STABLE LINK TO THE JOURNAL ARTICLE, ENSURING THAT READERS CAN LOCATE THE SOURCE EVEN IF URLS CHANGE. IT'S TYPICALLY INCLUDED AT THE END OF THE CITATION.

Q: HOW DO I CITE A JOURNAL ARTICLE THAT I FOUND THROUGH AN ONLINE DATABASE LIKE JSTOR IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: IF A DOI IS AVAILABLE, INCLUDE IT. IF NOT, YOU CAN CITE THE JOURNAL ARTICLE AS USUAL AND THEN INCLUDE THE NAME OF THE DATABASE AND A STABLE URL FOR THE ARTICLE. FOR EXAMPLE, IN A NOTE: JOHN SMITH, "AN INTERESTING STUDY," JOURNAL OF FINDINGS 10, NO. 2 (2023): 115, ACCESSED [DATE], [URL FROM DATABASE].

Q: WHAT IF A JOURNAL ARTICLE HAS NO AUTHOR LISTED? HOW DO I CITE IT IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: IF A JOURNAL ARTICLE HAS NO AUTHOR, BEGIN THE CITATION WITH THE TITLE OF THE ARTICLE. THIS APPLIES TO BOTH FOOTNOTE/ENDNOTE AND AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEMS. THE TITLE THEN FUNCTIONS AS THE ENTRY'S PRIMARY IDENTIFIER.

Q: HOW DO I HANDLE SUBSEQUENT CITATIONS OF THE SAME JOURNAL ARTICLE IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM?

A: FOR SUBSEQUENT CITATIONS OF THE SAME JOURNAL ARTICLE, USE A SHORTENED NOTE FORMAT. THIS TYPICALLY INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, A SHORTENED VERSION OF THE ARTICLE TITLE (IF NECESSARY FOR CLARITY), AND THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER BEING REFERENCED. FOR EXAMPLE: SMITH, "INTERESTING STUDY," 125.
