INTRODUCTION

CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR DATE FOR CONFERENCE PAPER REQUIRES METICULOUS ATTENTION TO DETAIL TO ENSURE ACADEMIC CREDIBILITY AND CLEAR COMMUNICATION. WE WILL EXPLORE THE FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND THE CORRESPONDING REFERENCE LIST ENTRIES, COVERING VARIOUS SOURCE TYPES COMMONLY ENCOUNTERED IN ACADEMIC RESEARCH. FURTHERMORE, THIS ARTICLE WILL PROVIDE PRACTICAL ADVICE ON FORMATTING ELEMENTS, COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID, AND THE OVERALL PURPOSE OF ADHERING TO THIS INFLUENTIAL CITATION STYLE.

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UNDERSTANDING THE CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE (CMOS) OFFERS TWO PRIMARY CITATION SYSTEMS: NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY AND AUTHOR-DATE. FOR CONFERENCE PAPERS, THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM IS OFTEN PREFERRED DUE TO ITS DIRECTNESS AND EASE OF USE FOR READERS WHO MAY NOT BE DEEPLY FAMILIAR WITH FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES. THIS SYSTEM RELIES ON BRIEF PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS WITHIN THE TEXT THAT DIRECT THE READER TO A FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY AT THE END OF THE PAPER. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM EMPHASIZES AUTHOR, YEAR, AND PAGE NUMBER FOR DIRECT QUOTATIONS, PROVIDING A QUICK WAY TO PINPOINT THE SOURCE OF INFORMATION. IT IS WIDELY ADOPTED IN THE SOCIAL SCIENCES, NATURAL SCIENCES, AND SOME HUMANITIES DISCIPLINES.

THE FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLE IS TO PROVIDE ENOUGH INFORMATION IN THE IN-TEXT CITATION FOR THE READER TO LOCATE THE FULL ENTRY IN THE REFERENCE LIST. THIS REQUIRES CONSISTENCY AND ACCURACY IN BOTH THE PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS AND THE CORRESPONDING REFERENCE LIST ENTRIES. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM IS DESIGNED TO BE EFFICIENT FOR READERS, ALLOWING THEM TO QUICKLY IDENTIFY THE SOURCE AND ITS PUBLICATION YEAR WITHOUT NEEDING TO CONSTANTLY REFER TO THE BOTTOM OF THE PAGE OR THE END OF THE DOCUMENT.

KEY COMPONENTS OF CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CITATIONS

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM IS CHARACTERIZED BY TWO MAIN COMPONENTS: THE IN-TEXT CITATION AND THE REFERENCE LIST. THE IN-TEXT CITATION IS A BRIEF REFERENCE PLACED DIRECTLY WITHIN THE BODY OF YOUR PAPER, TYPICALLY IN PARENTHESES. IT USUALLY INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION. FOR DIRECT QUOTATIONS OR PARAPHRASED SPECIFIC IDEAS, A PAGE NUMBER IS ALSO ESSENTIAL. THE REFERENCE LIST, APPEARING AT THE END OF YOUR PAPER, PROVIDES A COMPREHENSIVE ALPHABETICAL LISTING OF ALL SOURCES CITED IN THE TEXT. EACH ENTRY IN THE REFERENCE LIST CONTAINS FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC DETAILS ABOUT THE SOURCE.

THE CONNECTION BETWEEN THE IN-TEXT CITATION AND THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY IS PARAMOUNT. EVERY SOURCE MENTIONED IN THE TEXT MUST HAVE A CORRESPONDING ENTRY IN THE REFERENCE LIST, AND CONVERSELY, EVERY ENTRY IN THE REFERENCE LIST SHOULD BE CITED IN THE TEXT. THIS ENSURES THAT READERS CAN EASILY VERIFY YOUR SOURCES AND DELVE DEEPER INTO YOUR RESEARCH IF THEY WISH. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM PRIORITIZES THE PUBLICATION DATE, MAKING IT PARTICULARLY USEFUL FOR FIELDS WHERE THE TIMELINESS OF RESEARCH IS CRITICAL.

IN-TEXT CITATIONS IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE

IN THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, IN-TEXT CITATIONS ARE TYPICALLY ENCLOSED IN PARENTHESES. THE STANDARD FORMAT INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, FOLLOWED BY A COMMA, AND THEN THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION. FOR EXAMPLE, (SMITH 2020). IF THE AUTHOR'S NAME IS MENTIONED IN THE SENTENCE, YOU ONLY NEED TO INCLUDE THE YEAR IN PARENTHESES: SMITH (2020) ARGUES THAT... WHEN CITING A DIRECT QUOTATION, YOU MUST ALSO INCLUDE THE PAGE NUMBER(S) FROM WHICH THE QUOTATION WAS TAKEN. THIS IS FORMATTED AS (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR, PAGE NUMBER). FOR EXAMPLE, (SMITH 2020, 45). IF A SOURCE HAS MULTIPLE AUTHORS, THE RULES FOR CITING THEM VARY DEPENDING ON THE NUMBER OF AUTHORS.

FOR TWO AUTHORS, BOTH LAST NAMES ARE INCLUDED, SEPARATED BY "AND": (SMITH AND JONES 2021). FOR THREE OR MORE AUTHORS, LIST ONLY THE FIRST AUTHOR'S LAST NAME FOLLOWED BY "ET AL." AND THE YEAR: (DAVIS ET AL. 2019). WHEN CITING MULTIPLE WORKS BY THE SAME AUTHOR IN THE SAME YEAR, YOU WOULD ADD LOWERCASE LETTERS TO THE YEAR, SUCH AS (MILLER 2018A) AND (MILLER 2018B), CORRESPONDING TO THE ORDER IN WHICH THEY APPEAR IN THE REFERENCE LIST. IF A SOURCE HAS NO AUTHOR, YOU WOULD USE A SHORTENED VERSION OF THE TITLE AND THE YEAR. IF A SOURCE HAS NO DATE, YOU WOULD USE "N.D." FOR NO DATE.

CITING DIRECT QUOTATIONS

WHEN YOU USE THE EXACT WORDS FROM A SOURCE, A DIRECT QUOTATION IS NECESSARY. CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE REQUIRES THE INCLUSION OF THE PAGE NUMBER IN THE IN-TEXT CITATION FOR DIRECT QUOTATIONS. THIS ALLOWS READERS TO LOCATE THE PRECISE SENTENCE OR PHRASE YOU ARE REFERENCING. THE FORMAT IS CONSISTENT: (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR, PAGE NUMBER). FOR INSTANCE, A SENTENCE MIGHT END WITH: "THIS PHENOMENON IS WIDELY STUDIED" (GARCIA 2017, 112). FOR MULTI-PAGE QUOTATIONS, USE A HYPHEN: (GARCIA 2017, 112-113).

PARAPHRASING AND SUMMARIZING

WHEN YOU PARAPHRASE OR SUMMARIZE AN IDEA OR INFORMATION FROM A SOURCE, A PAGE NUMBER IS OFTEN RECOMMENDED, ESPECIALLY IF YOU ARE DISCUSSING A SPECIFIC POINT. WHILE NOT ALWAYS MANDATORY FOR GENERAL PARAPHRASING, INCLUDING THE PAGE NUMBER ENHANCES CLARITY AND ALLOWS FOR EASIER VERIFICATION OF YOUR INTERPRETATION. THE FORMAT REMAINS SIMILAR: (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR, PAGE NUMBER). FOR EXAMPLE: THE RESEARCH SUGGESTS A CORRELATION BETWEEN THE TWO VARIABLES (CHEN 2019, 55). THIS PRACTICE IS PARTICULARLY USEFUL WHEN DEALING WITH COMPLEX ARGUMENTS OR DATA WITHIN A SOURCE.

REFERENCE LIST ENTRIES IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE

THE REFERENCE LIST, WHICH APPEARS AT THE END OF YOUR PAPER, PROVIDES THE FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC DETAILS FOR EVERY SOURCE CITED IN YOUR TEXT. THIS LIST SHOULD BE ALPHABETIZED BY THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME. EACH ENTRY INCLUDES ESSENTIAL INFORMATION SUCH AS THE AUTHOR'S NAME, PUBLICATION YEAR, TITLE OF THE WORK, AND PUBLICATION DETAILS. THE FORMATTING VARIES DEPENDING ON THE TYPE OF SOURCE, BUT CONSISTENCY IS KEY.

THE PRIMARY GOAL OF THE REFERENCE LIST IS TO GIVE YOUR READERS ALL THE NECESSARY INFORMATION TO FIND AND CONSULT THE ORIGINAL SOURCES THEMSELVES. THIS TRANSPARENCY IS A CORNERSTONE OF ACADEMIC INTEGRITY. IT ALSO DEMONSTRATES THE BREADTH AND DEPTH OF YOUR RESEARCH TO YOUR AUDIENCE. ACCURACY IN TRANSCRIBING TITLES, PUBLICATION YEARS, AND OTHER DETAILS IS CRUCIAL FOR THE EFFECTIVENESS OF YOUR REFERENCE LIST.

STRUCTURE OF A REFERENCE ENTRY

A TYPICAL REFERENCE ENTRY IN CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE FORMAT BEGINS WITH THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, FOLLOWED BY A COMMA, AND THEN THEIR FIRST NAME. THE PUBLICATION YEAR IS ENCLOSED IN PARENTHESES. THIS IS FOLLOWED BY THE TITLE OF THE WORK, ITALICIZED FOR BOOKS AND ARTICLES, OR ENCLOSED IN QUOTATION MARKS FOR CHAPTERS OR ESSAYS WITHIN LARGER WORKS. FINALLY, PUBLICATION INFORMATION, SUCH AS THE PUBLISHER, JOURNAL NAME, VOLUME, AND ISSUE NUMBERS, IS PROVIDED.

- **Book:** AUTHOR LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. *TITLE OF BOOK*. CITY OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER.
- **JOURNAL ARTICLE:** AUTHOR LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. "TITLE OF ARTICLE." *TITLE OF JOURNAL* VOLUME (ISSUE): PAGE NUMBERS.

THESE ARE SIMPLIFIED EXAMPLES, AND THE EXACT FORMATTING CAN BECOME MORE INTRICATE DEPENDING ON THE SPECIFIC PUBLICATION DETAILS AND SOURCE TYPE.

COMMON SOURCE TYPES AND THEIR CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE FORMATTING

DIFFERENT TYPES OF SOURCES REQUIRE SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT FORMATTING FOR BOTH IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND REFERENCE LIST ENTRIES. FAMILIARIZING YOURSELF WITH THE CORRECT FORMAT FOR COMMON SOURCES IS ESSENTIAL FOR ACCURATE CITATION.

Books

FOR A BOOK, THE IN-TEXT CITATION IS (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR). THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY IS: AUTHOR LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. *TITLE OF BOOK*. CITY OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER.

EXAMPLE REFERENCE ENTRY: SMITH, JOHN. 2020. *THE HISTORY OF CITATION STYLES*. CHICAGO: UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO PRESS.

JOURNAL ARTICLES

FOR A JOURNAL ARTICLE, THE IN-TEXT CITATION IS (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR). THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY IS: AUTHOR LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. "TITLE OF ARTICLE." *TITLE OF JOURNAL* VOLUME (ISSUE): PAGE NUMBERS.

EXAMPLE REFERENCE ENTRY: DAVIS, EMILY. 2019. "ANALYZING CITATION TRENDS." *JOURNAL OF ACADEMIC RESEARCH* 15 (3): 45-60.

WEBSITES AND ONLINE SOURCES

CITING ONLINE SOURCES REQUIRES ATTENTION TO THE ACCESSIBILITY OF THE INFORMATION. THE IN-TEXT CITATION IS TYPICALLY (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR) OR (ORGANIZATION NAME YEAR) IF THERE IS NO INDIVIDUAL AUTHOR. THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY SHOULD INCLUDE THE AUTHOR OR ORGANIZATION, YEAR, TITLE OF THE SPECIFIC PAGE OR DOCUMENT, WEBSITE NAME, AND THE URL. IF A PUBLICATION DATE IS NOT AVAILABLE, USE "N.D." FOR NO DATE.

EXAMPLE REFERENCE ENTRY: NATIONAL ARCHIVES. 2022. "GUIDE TO ARCHIVAL RESEARCH." NATIONAL ARCHIVES WEBSITE. ACCESSED OCTOBER 26, 2023. [HTTPS://WWW.ARCHIVES.GOV/RESEARCH/GUIDE](https://www.archives.gov/research/guide).

CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

CITING CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS CAN VARY DEPENDING ON WHETHER YOU ARE CITING THE ENTIRE PROCEEDINGS OR A SPECIFIC PAPER WITHIN THEM. FOR A SPECIFIC PAPER, THE AUTHOR-DATE FORMAT WOULD BE SIMILAR TO A JOURNAL ARTICLE, BUT WITH CONFERENCE-SPECIFIC DETAILS. THE IN-TEXT CITATION IS (AUTHOR LAST NAME YEAR). THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY FOR A PAPER IN PUBLISHED PROCEEDINGS MIGHT LOOK LIKE:

AUTHOR LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. "TITLE OF PAPER." IN *PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONFERENCE NAME*, EDITED BY EDITOR NAME(S), PAGE NUMBERS. CITY OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER (IF APPLICABLE).

EXAMPLE REFERENCE ENTRY: LEE, SARAH. 2021. "INNOVATIONS IN AI ETHICS." IN *PROCEEDINGS OF THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE*, 123-130. SAN FRANCISCO: IEEE.

SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS FOR CONFERENCE PAPERS

CONFERENCE PAPERS OFTEN HAVE A SHORTER TURNAROUND TIME AND A DIFFERENT AUDIENCE THAN A PUBLISHED JOURNAL ARTICLE OR BOOK. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM IS WELL-SUITED FOR THIS ENVIRONMENT BECAUSE IT ALLOWS FOR QUICK IDENTIFICATION OF SOURCES WITHOUT EXTENSIVE FOOTNOTES THAT MIGHT BE CUMBERSOME IN A PRESENTATION. WHEN PREPARING YOUR CONFERENCE PAPER, ENSURE THAT YOUR CITATIONS ARE CLEAR AND ACCESSIBLE TO AN AUDIENCE THAT MAY INCLUDE SCHOLARS FROM VARIOUS SUB-DISCIPLINES.

IT IS ALSO IMPORTANT TO CONSIDER HOW YOUR PAPER MIGHT BE PUBLISHED AFTER THE CONFERENCE. SOME CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS ARE PUBLISHED AS STANDALONE BOOKS, WHILE OTHERS APPEAR AS SPECIAL ISSUES OF JOURNALS. THE CITATION STYLE YOU USE IN YOUR ORIGINAL PAPER SHOULD BE CONSISTENT WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE PUBLISHER IF YOUR PAPER IS SELECTED FOR FURTHER PUBLICATION. ALWAYS CHECK THE SPECIFIC GUIDELINES PROVIDED BY THE CONFERENCE ORGANIZERS.

AUDIENCE AND ACCESSIBILITY

WHEN PRESENTING AT A CONFERENCE, YOUR AUDIENCE MIGHT NOT BE SPECIALISTS IN YOUR EXACT FIELD. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM'S DIRECTNESS AIDS IN THIS ACCESSIBILITY. A READER CAN QUICKLY GRASP THE ORIGIN OF AN IDEA AND ITS PUBLICATION YEAR, ALLOWING THEM TO FOLLOW YOUR ARGUMENT WITHOUT BEING BOGGED DOWN BY COMPLEX CITATION MECHANICS. THIS MAKES YOUR RESEARCH MORE DIGESTIBLE AND IMPACTFUL FOR A BROADER ACADEMIC AUDIENCE.

POTENTIAL FOR PUBLICATION

MANY CONFERENCE PAPERS ARE SUBMITTED WITH THE HOPE OF BEING PUBLISHED IN SUBSEQUENT PROCEEDINGS OR JOURNALS. WHILE THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM IS COMMON, THE SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR FORMAL PUBLICATION MAY DIFFER. IT IS PRUDENT TO FAMILIARIZE YOURSELF WITH THE CITATION STYLE OF THE TARGET PUBLICATION VENUE, IF KNOWN, EVEN WHEN INITIALLY PREPARING YOUR CONFERENCE PAPER. THIS PROACTIVE APPROACH CAN SAVE SIGNIFICANT REVISION TIME LATER.

FORMATTING AND STYLE GUIDELINES

BEYOND THE SPECIFIC CITATION ELEMENTS, ADHERENCE TO GENERAL FORMATTING AND STYLE GUIDELINES IS CRUCIAL FOR A PROFESSIONAL CONFERENCE PAPER. THIS INCLUDES MAINTAINING CONSISTENT MARGINS, FONT USAGE, AND SPACING. THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE ALSO PROVIDES GUIDELINES FOR CAPITALIZATION, PUNCTUATION, AND THE USE OF ITALICS OR QUOTATION MARKS, ALL OF WHICH CONTRIBUTE TO THE OVERALL CLARITY AND READABILITY OF YOUR WORK.

PAY CLOSE ATTENTION TO THE HIERARCHY OF HEADINGS AND SUBHEADINGS TO STRUCTURE YOUR PAPER LOGICALLY. A WELL-ORGANIZED PAPER WITH CLEAR HEADINGS MAKES IT EASIER FOR READERS TO NAVIGATE AND UNDERSTAND YOUR RESEARCH. ENSURE THAT YOUR IN-TEXT CITATIONS ARE CONSISTENTLY FORMATTED AND THAT THEY ACCURATELY CORRESPOND TO YOUR REFERENCE LIST ENTRIES.

CONSISTENCY IS KEY

THE MOST CRITICAL ASPECT OF ANY CITATION STYLE, INCLUDING CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE, IS CONSISTENCY. WHETHER IT'S THE FORMAT OF THE AUTHOR'S NAME, THE PLACEMENT OF THE YEAR, OR THE PUNCTUATION WITHIN A REFERENCE ENTRY, MAINTAINING UNIFORMITY THROUGHOUT YOUR PAPER IS PARAMOUNT. INCONSISTENCIES CAN DISTRACT READERS, UNDERMINE YOUR CREDIBILITY, AND SUGGEST A LACK OF CAREFUL ATTENTION TO DETAIL.

PROOFREADING AND REVIEW

BEFORE SUBMITTING YOUR CONFERENCE PAPER, DEDICATE AMPLE TIME TO THOROUGH PROOFREADING AND REVIEW. CHECK FOR ANY TYPOGRAPHICAL ERRORS, GRAMMATICAL MISTAKES, AND, MOST IMPORTANTLY, ERRORS IN YOUR CITATIONS. A FINAL REVIEW OF YOUR IN-TEXT CITATIONS AGAINST YOUR REFERENCE LIST IS INDISPENSABLE. THIS STEP OFTEN REVEALS OVERLOOKED INCONSISTENCIES OR MISSING INFORMATION.

CONCLUSION

MASTERING THE CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM FOR CONFERENCE PAPERS IS AN ESSENTIAL SKILL FOR ANY ACADEMIC. BY UNDERSTANDING THE PRINCIPLES OF IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND REFERENCE LIST ENTRIES, AND BY APPLYING THEM CONSISTENTLY ACROSS ALL SOURCE TYPES, YOU ENSURE THE INTEGRITY AND CLARITY OF YOUR RESEARCH. THIS GUIDE HAS PROVIDED A COMPREHENSIVE OVERVIEW, FROM THE FUNDAMENTAL COMPONENTS TO SPECIFIC FORMATTING CONSIDERATIONS FOR COMMON SOURCES AND THE UNIQUE CONTEXT OF CONFERENCE PRESENTATIONS. ADHERING TO THESE GUIDELINES NOT ONLY FULFILLS ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS BUT ALSO ENHANCES THE ACCESSIBILITY AND IMPACT OF YOUR SCHOLARLY WORK.

FAQ

Q: WHAT IS THE PRIMARY DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE AND NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY?

A: THE PRIMARY DIFFERENCE LIES IN HOW CITATIONS ARE PRESENTED WITHIN THE TEXT. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM USES PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS IN THE TEXT (AUTHOR YEAR), WHICH CORRESPOND TO A REFERENCE LIST AT THE END. THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM USES NUMBERED FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES IN THE TEXT, WITH A FULL BIBLIOGRAPHY AT THE END.

Q: IS IT ACCEPTABLE TO ABBREVIATE AUTHOR NAMES IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE IN-TEXT CITATIONS?

A: NO, YOU SHOULD NOT ABBREVIATE AUTHOR NAMES IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE IN-TEXT CITATIONS. YOU MUST USE THE FULL LAST NAME OF THE AUTHOR(S).

Q: How do I cite a source with no author in Chicago style author-date?

A: If a source has no author, you use a shortened version of the title in the in-text citation and in the reference list, followed by the year. For example, in-text might be ("Guide to Research" 2022), and the reference list entry would begin with the shortened title.

Q: What is the correct format for citing multiple works by the same author in the same year?

A: When citing multiple works by the same author in the same year, you add lowercase letters (a, b, c, etc.) to the year in both the in-text citation and the reference list entry, corresponding to the order in which they appear in your reference list. For example: (Smith 2020a) and (Smith 2020b).

Q: Do I need to include page numbers for paraphrased information in Chicago style author-date?

A: While not always strictly mandatory for general paraphrasing, including the page number is highly recommended for clarity and ease of verification, especially when paraphrasing specific ideas or detailed arguments.

Q: How do I cite a website in Chicago style author-date if there is no publication date?

A: If a website lacks a publication date, you use "n.d." for "no date" in both the in-text citation and the reference list entry. You should also include the access date for the source.

Q: Should I italicize the title of a chapter in a book when citing it in Chicago style author-date?

A: No, the title of a chapter or essay within a larger work (like a book or journal) should be enclosed in quotation marks, not italicized. The title of the larger work itself (e.g., the book title) is italicized.

Q: What is the role of the "et al." in Chicago style author-date citations?

A: "Et al." is Latin for "and others." It is used in Chicago style author-date in-text citations when a source has three or more authors. You list only the first author's last name followed by "et al." and the year.

Q: How is the reference list organized in Chicago style author-date?

A: The reference list is organized alphabetically by the author's last name. If a source has no author, it is alphabetized by the first significant word of the title (ignoring articles like "a," "an," and "the").
