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UNDERSTANDING THE CHICAGO STYLE BASICS

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE, FIRST PUBLISHED IN 1906, HAS BECOME A CORNERSTONE FOR WRITERS, EDITORS, AND PUBLISHERS. IT PROVIDES GUIDELINES FOR MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION, CITATION, AND STYLISTIC CONVENTIONS. ITS FLEXIBILITY LIES IN OFFERING TWO PRIMARY SYSTEMS FOR CITATION: THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM AND THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM. BOTH SYSTEMS AIM TO PROVIDE READERS WITH SUFFICIENT INFORMATION TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL SOURCE OF QUOTED MATERIAL, THEREBY GIVING CREDIT TO THE ORIGINAL AUTHOR AND ALLOWING FOR FURTHER RESEARCH. UNDERSTANDING THESE FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES IS THE FIRST STEP TOWARD MASTERING CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES.

THE PURPOSE OF BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES

BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES, WHETHER IN A BIBLIOGRAPHY OR A REFERENCE LIST, SERVE A CRITICAL PURPOSE: TO PROVIDE A COMPLETE RECORD OF ALL SOURCES CONSULTED AND CITED WITHIN A WORK. FOR DIRECT QUOTES, THESE ENTRIES ARE PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT BECAUSE THEY IDENTIFY THE EXACT LOCATION FROM WHICH THE QUOTED WORDS WERE TAKEN. THIS ALLOWS READERS TO VERIFY THE ACCURACY OF THE QUOTATION, EXPLORE THE CONTEXT FROM WHICH IT WAS EXTRACTED, AND DELVE DEEPER INTO THE ORIGINAL SOURCE MATERIAL. A WELL-CONSTRUCTED BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY FOR A QUOTE IS A HALLMARK OF SCHOLARLY INTEGRITY.

KEY COMPONENTS OF A CHICAGO STYLE ENTRY

REGARDLESS OF THE SYSTEM USED, MOST CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES SHARE COMMON ELEMENTS. THESE TYPICALLY INCLUDE THE AUTHOR(S) OR EDITOR(S), TITLE OF THE WORK, PUBLICATION INFORMATION (PLACE, PUBLISHER, YEAR), AND SPECIFIC LOCATION DETAILS FOR THE QUOTE, SUCH AS PAGE NUMBERS. FOR ARTICLES OR CHAPTERS WITHIN LARGER WORKS, ADDITIONAL INFORMATION LIKE THE JOURNAL TITLE, VOLUME, ISSUE NUMBER, OR BOOK TITLE IS REQUIRED. PRECISION IN GATHERING AND PRESENTING THESE DETAILS IS PARAMOUNT FOR EFFECTIVE CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES.

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM VS. NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM

CHICAGO STYLE'S DUAL CITATION SYSTEMS CATER TO DIFFERENT ACADEMIC DISCIPLINES AND PREFERENCES. THE CHOICE BETWEEN THEM SIGNIFICANTLY IMPACTS HOW DIRECT QUOTES ARE HANDLED BOTH IN THE TEXT AND IN THE FINAL BIBLIOGRAPHIC COMPILATION. UNDERSTANDING THE DISTINCTIONS IS KEY TO APPLYING THE CORRECT FORMATTING FOR CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES.

THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM EXPLAINED

IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, DIRECT QUOTES AND PARAPHRASED IDEAS ARE REFERENCED IN THE TEXT USING SUPERSCRIT NUMBER THAT CORRESPOND TO FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES. THESE NOTES CONTAIN ABBREVIATED CITATION INFORMATION. THE BIBLIOGRAPHY, APPEARING AT THE END OF THE WORK, PROVIDES FULL, DETAILED ENTRIES FOR ALL SOURCES CITED IN THE NOTES. FOR DIRECT QUOTES, THE NOTE WILL PINPOINT THE EXACT PAGE NUMBER, AND THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY WILL REFLECT THE FULL PUBLICATION DETAILS OF THE SOURCE. THIS SYSTEM IS PREVALENT IN FIELDS LIKE HISTORY, LITERATURE, AND THE ARTS.

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM EXPLAINED

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM USES IN-TEXT PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS, TYPICALLY CONSISTING OF THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION (E.G., SMITH 2020, 15). IF A DIRECT QUOTE IS USED, THE PAGE NUMBER MUST ALSO BE INCLUDED (E.G., SMITH 2020, 15). THE REFERENCE LIST AT THE END OF THE DOCUMENT CONTAINS FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES FOR ALL SOURCES CITED IN THE TEXT, ARRANGED ALPHABETICALLY BY AUTHOR'S LAST NAME. THIS SYSTEM IS MORE COMMON IN THE SOCIAL SCIENCES AND NATURAL SCIENCES.

CRAFTING BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES FOR QUOTES: CORE PRINCIPLES

THE FOUNDATION OF ACCURATE CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES LIES IN ADHERING TO A SET OF CORE PRINCIPLES THAT ENSURE CLARITY AND COMPLETENESS. WHETHER YOU ARE USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM OR THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, THE GOAL IS TO GUIDE YOUR READER BACK TO THE ORIGINAL SOURCE WITH MINIMAL EFFORT.

ACCURACY IS PARAMOUNT

THE MOST CRUCIAL ASPECT OF ANY BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY IS ACCURACY. EVERY DETAIL, FROM THE AUTHOR'S NAME TO THE PUBLICATION YEAR AND PAGE NUMBER, MUST BE PRECISELY AS IT APPEARS IN THE ORIGINAL SOURCE. MISSPELLINGS, INCORRECT DATES, OR MISSING PUNCTUATION CAN RENDER AN ENTRY UNHELPFUL OR EVEN MISLEADING. WHEN CITING A DIRECT QUOTE, THE PAGE NUMBER IS NON-NEGOTIABLE AND MUST BE EXACT.

CONSISTENCY IN FORMATTING

ONCE YOU CHOOSE A SYSTEM (NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY OR AUTHOR-DATE), YOU MUST APPLY ITS RULES CONSISTENTLY THROUGHOUT YOUR ENTIRE WORK. THIS INCLUDES THE FORMATTING OF IN-TEXT CITATIONS, NOTES, AND THE FINAL BIBLIOGRAPHY. INCONSISTENCY IN HOW YOU FORMAT CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES CAN CONFUSE YOUR READERS AND DETRACT FROM THE PROFESSIONALISM OF YOUR WRITING.

PROVIDING SUFFICIENT DETAIL

THE LEVEL OF DETAIL REQUIRED IN A BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY IS DESIGNED TO BE SUFFICIENT FOR A READER TO LOCATE THE SOURCE. THIS MEANS INCLUDING ALL RELEVANT IDENTIFYING INFORMATION. FOR A DIRECT QUOTE, THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER WHERE THE QUOTE APPEARS IS THE MOST CRITICAL PIECE OF DETAIL BEYOND THE STANDARD BIBLIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION.

HANDLING DIRECT QUOTES IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM

THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM REQUIRES A SPECIFIC APPROACH TO INTEGRATING DIRECT QUOTES AND THEIR CORRESPONDING BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES. THE IN-TEXT CITATION SERVES AS A POINTER, AND THE NOTE AND BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY PROVIDE THE FULL DETAILS.

FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES FOR QUOTES

WHEN YOU INCLUDE A DIRECT QUOTE IN YOUR TEXT USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, YOU WILL TYPICALLY ADD A SUPERScript NUMBER IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE QUOTATION MARKS, OR AFTER THE PUNCTUATION IF THE QUOTE ENDS THE SENTENCE. THIS NUMBER CORRESPONDS TO A FOOTNOTE AT THE BOTTOM OF THE PAGE OR AN ENDNOTE AT THE END OF THE CHAPTER OR DOCUMENT. THE NOTE WILL INCLUDE THE AUTHOR, TITLE, PUBLICATION INFORMATION, AND THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER OF THE QUOTE. FOR SUBSEQUENT CITATIONS OF THE SAME SOURCE, A SHORTENED NOTE FORMAT CAN BE USED.

THE CORRESPONDING BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY FOR A SOURCE FROM WHICH YOU'VE QUOTED WILL BE A FULL, DETAILED ENTRY. FOR EXAMPLE, A BOOK ENTRY MIGHT LOOK LIKE THIS:

AUTHOR LAST NAME, AUTHOR FIRST NAME. TITLE OF BOOK. PLACE OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER, YEAR.

IF THE QUOTE WAS FROM PAGE 45, THE FOOTNOTE MIGHT READ:

1. AUTHOR LAST NAME, TITLE OF BOOK, 45.

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY ITSELF WOULD BE THE COMPLETE CITATION WITHOUT THE PAGE NUMBER, BUT IT IS THE PRESENCE OF THE QUOTE AND ITS SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER IN THE NOTE THAT LINKS IT DIRECTLY TO THE FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC RECORD. THIS ENSURES THAT ALL NECESSARY INFORMATION FOR CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES IS READILY ACCESSIBLE.

INCORPORATING DIRECT QUOTES IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM STREAMLINES THE CITATION PROCESS WITH IN-TEXT PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS, AND ITS HANDLING OF QUOTES IS EQUALLY DIRECT.

IN-TEXT CITATIONS FOR QUOTES

WHEN USING A DIRECT QUOTE IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, THE IN-TEXT CITATION MUST INCLUDE THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION, AND THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER (OR RANGE OF PAGES) WHERE THE QUOTE CAN BE FOUND. FOR INSTANCE: "THE QUICK BROWN FOX JUMPS OVER THE LAZY DOG" (SMITH 2020, 15). IF THE QUOTE SPANS MULTIPLE PAGES, YOU WOULD USE A RANGE, SUCH AS (SMITH 2020, 15-16). THE AUTHOR'S NAME CAN ALSO BE INTEGRATED INTO THE SENTENCE, FOLLOWED BY THE YEAR AND PAGE NUMBER IN PARENTHESES: AS SMITH (2020, 15) OBSERVED, "THE QUICK BROWN

FOX JUMPS OVER THE LAZY DOG."

THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY

THE REFERENCE LIST AT THE END OF THE DOCUMENT WILL CONTAIN FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES FOR ALL SOURCES CITED IN THE TEXT, ALPHABETIZED BY AUTHOR'S LAST NAME. THE ENTRY FOR THE SMITH BOOK WOULD BE FORMATTED SIMILARLY TO THE BIBLIOGRAPHY IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, BUT CRUCIALLY, IT IS THE IN-TEXT CITATION THAT SPECIFICALLY LINKS THE QUOTE TO ITS SOURCE AND PAGE NUMBER. THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY ITSELF FOR A BOOK TYPICALLY LOOKS LIKE THIS:

AUTHOR LAST NAME, AUTHOR FIRST NAME. YEAR. TITLE OF BOOK. PLACE OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER.

THE PAGE NUMBER FOR THE QUOTE IS EXCLUSIVELY IN THE IN-TEXT CITATION. THIS DIRECT LINKAGE IS FUNDAMENTAL TO EFFECTIVE CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES.

COMMON SOURCE TYPES AND THEIR CHICAGO STYLE ENTRY FORMATS

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE PROVIDES SPECIFIC FORMATS FOR A WIDE ARRAY OF SOURCE TYPES. PROPERLY CITING DIRECT QUOTES FROM THESE SOURCES ENSURES YOUR BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES ARE COMPLETE AND ACCURATE.

Books

FOR A SINGLE-AUTHOR BOOK IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY IS:

LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. TITLE OF BOOK. PLACE OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER, YEAR.

IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, IT'S:

LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. TITLE OF BOOK. PLACE OF PUBLICATION: PUBLISHER.

WHEN QUOTING, THE PAGE NUMBER IS ESSENTIAL IN EITHER THE NOTE OR THE IN-TEXT CITATION.

JOURNAL ARTICLES

FOR A JOURNAL ARTICLE IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM BIBLIOGRAPHY:

LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. "TITLE OF ARTICLE." TITLE OF JOURNAL VOLUME, NO. ISSUE (YEAR): PAGE RANGE.

IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM REFERENCE LIST:

LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. YEAR. "TITLE OF ARTICLE." TITLE OF JOURNAL VOLUME, NO. ISSUE: PAGE RANGE.

AGAIN, THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER OF THE QUOTE IS CRUCIAL FOR CITATION.

WEBSITES AND ONLINE ARTICLES

CITING ONLINE SOURCES CAN BE MORE COMPLEX DUE TO VARYING INFORMATION AVAILABILITY. GENERALLY, FOR A WEBPAGE IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM BIBLIOGRAPHY:

LAST NAME, FIRST NAME (IF AVAILABLE). "TITLE OF PAGE." TITLE OF WEBSITE. LAST MODIFIED OR ACCESSED DATE. URL.

IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM REFERENCE LIST:

LAST NAME, FIRST NAME (IF AVAILABLE). YEAR (IF AVAILABLE). "TITLE OF PAGE." TITLE OF WEBSITE. LAST MODIFIED OR ACCESSED DATE. URL.

FOR ONLINE ARTICLES WITH CLEAR PUBLICATION DATES AND AUTHORS, TREAT THEM SIMILARLY TO JOURNAL ARTICLES BUT ENSURE THE URL AND ACCESS DATE ARE INCLUDED.

FORMATTING BLOCK QUOTES AND SHORT QUOTATIONS

THE WAY DIRECT QUOTES ARE INTEGRATED INTO YOUR TEXT DIFFERS BASED ON THEIR LENGTH, AND THIS DISTINCTION ALSO INFLUENCES HOW THEY ARE PRESENTED IN YOUR CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES.

SHORT QUOTATIONS

SHORT QUOTATIONS, GENERALLY THOSE OF FEWER THAN FIVE LINES OF PROSE OR THREE LINES OF VERSE, ARE ENCLOSED IN QUOTATION MARKS AND RUN INTO THE BODY OF YOUR TEXT. AS DISCUSSED, THEY ARE FOLLOWED BY A CITATION (NOTE OR IN-TEXT PARENTHETICAL) THAT INCLUDES THE PAGE NUMBER. THE QUOTATION MARKS SHOULD ACCURATELY REFLECT THE ORIGINAL PUNCTUATION.

BLOCK QUOTATIONS

LONGER QUOTATIONS, OR BLOCK QUOTES, ARE SET OFF FROM THE MAIN TEXT BY INDENTING THE ENTIRE QUOTATION. THEY DO NOT USE QUOTATION MARKS. THE INDENTATION TYPICALLY BEGINS ONE-HALF INCH FROM THE LEFT MARGIN, AND THE ENTIRE BLOCK IS DOUBLE-SPACED. THE CITATION FOLLOWS THE BLOCK QUOTE, USUALLY AFTER THE FINAL PUNCTUATION. FOR EXAMPLE, IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, THE SUPERScript NUMBER WOULD APPEAR AFTER THE BLOCK QUOTE'S FINAL PERIOD. IN THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, THE PARENTHETICAL CITATION WOULD FOLLOW THE BLOCK QUOTE. THE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY REMAINS THE SAME, BUT THE PRESENTATION OF THE QUOTE IN THE TEXT IS DISTINCTLY FORMATTED.

QUOTING FROM DIFFERENT MEDIA: BOOKS, ARTICLES, AND ONLINE SOURCES

THE PRINCIPLES OF CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES APPLY BROADLY, BUT SPECIFIC SOURCE TYPES REQUIRE ATTENTION TO DETAIL.

BOOKS WITH MULTIPLE AUTHORS OR EDITORS

WHEN A BOOK HAS TWO AUTHORS, LIST BOTH IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY. FOR THREE OR MORE, LIST ONLY THE FIRST AUTHOR FOLLOWED BY "ET AL." IN NOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHIES. HOWEVER, THE FULL LIST OF AUTHORS SHOULD BE PROVIDED IN THE FIRST NOTE OR IN-TEXT CITATION IF THAT IS THE CONVENTION FOR YOUR CHOSEN SYSTEM. EDITORS ARE TREATED SIMILARLY, WITH THE INDICATION "ED." OR "EDS." FOLLOWING THEIR NAMES.

JOURNAL ARTICLES WITH SPECIAL CASES

ARTICLES FROM ONLINE JOURNALS OFTEN INCLUDE DOIs (DIGITAL OBJECT IDENTIFIERS). IF A DOI IS AVAILABLE, IT SHOULD BE

INCLUDED IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY, AS IT PROVIDES A STABLE LINK TO THE ARTICLE. THE FORMAT TYPICALLY INVOLVES THE DOI PRECEDED BY "DOI:" AFTER THE URL.

WEBSITES WITH NO AUTHOR OR DATE

IF A WEBPAGE LACKS AN AUTHOR, USE THE ORGANIZATION OR WEBSITE NAME AS THE AUTHOR. IF THERE IS NO PUBLICATION OR MODIFICATION DATE, USE "N.D." FOR "NO DATE." FOR THE ACCESS DATE, USE THE DATE YOU ACCESSED THE MATERIAL. THESE VARIATIONS ARE IMPORTANT FOR ENSURING COMPLETE AND ACCURATE CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES, ESPECIALLY FOR LESS CONVENTIONALLY STRUCTURED ONLINE SOURCES.

ENSURING ACCURACY AND CONSISTENCY IN CHICAGO STYLE

ACHIEVING A HIGH STANDARD OF ACCURACY AND CONSISTENCY IN YOUR CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES IS VITAL FOR ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND READER TRUST.

PROOFREADING YOUR CITATIONS

METICULOUS PROOFREADING IS NON-NEGOTIABLE. COMPARE YOUR IN-TEXT CITATIONS, NOTES, AND BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES AGAINST YOUR SOURCE MATERIALS. DOUBLE-CHECK NAMES, DATES, TITLES, PAGE NUMBERS, AND PUNCTUATION. A SINGLE ERROR CAN CAST DOUBT ON THE RELIABILITY OF YOUR WORK.

USING CITATION MANAGEMENT TOOLS

WHILE MANUAL ENTRY IS ALWAYS AN OPTION, CITATION MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE CAN BE INVALUABLE. TOOLS LIKE ZOTERO, MENDELEY, OR ENDNOTE CAN HELP YOU ORGANIZE YOUR SOURCES AND GENERATE CITATIONS AND BIBLIOGRAPHIES IN CHICAGO STYLE. HOWEVER, ALWAYS REVIEW THE OUTPUT OF THESE TOOLS FOR ACCURACY, AS THEY CAN SOMETIMES MAKE ERRORS.

CONSULTING THE OFFICIAL MANUAL

FOR DEFINITIVE GUIDANCE AND TO RESOLVE COMPLEX CITATION ISSUES, ALWAYS REFER TO THE LATEST EDITION OF THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE. IT IS THE AUTHORITATIVE SOURCE FOR ALL STYLE-RELATED QUESTIONS, INCLUDING THE MOST NUANCED ASPECTS OF CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES QUOTES.

TROUBLESHOOTING COMMON CHICAGO STYLE CITATION ERRORS

EVEN EXPERIENCED WRITERS CAN ENCOUNTER CHALLENGES WITH CITATION FORMATTING. UNDERSTANDING COMMON ERRORS CAN HELP YOU AVOID THEM.

INCORRECT PAGE NUMBERING

FOR DIRECT QUOTES, THE MOST COMMON ERROR IS AN INCORRECT OR MISSING PAGE NUMBER. ALWAYS ENSURE THE PAGE NUMBER CITED IS THE EXACT PAGE WHERE THE QUOTE APPEARS. FOR RANGES, USE AN EN DASH (–) BETWEEN PAGE NUMBERS.

INCONSISTENT USE OF PUNCTUATION AND FORMATTING

Errors in punctuation, such as misplaced commas, periods, or quotation marks, are frequent. Similarly, inconsistent use of italics for titles or quotation marks for article titles can occur. Sticking strictly to the CMOS guidelines will prevent these issues.

OMITTING ESSENTIAL SOURCE INFORMATION

Forgetting to include key details like the publisher, publication year, or URL for online sources can render an entry incomplete. Review your entries against the requirements for each source type to ensure all necessary information is present for accurate Chicago style bibliographic entries.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES

QUOTES

Q: HOW DO I FORMAT A DIRECT QUOTE THAT SPANS MULTIPLE PAGES IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: When a direct quote extends across multiple pages, in the notes-bibliography system, the note would typically include the page range (e.g., Smith, Book Title, 15–16). In the author-date system, the in-text citation would also show the range (e.g., Smith 2020, 15–16). The bibliography entry itself does not include page numbers.

Q: WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE IN CITING A QUOTE FROM A BOOK VERSUS A JOURNAL ARTICLE IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: The fundamental difference lies in the additional publication details required for journal articles, such as the journal title, volume, issue number, and page range of the entire article. For both, the specific page number of the quote is crucial in the note or in-text citation.

Q: WHEN SHOULD I USE BLOCK QUOTES VERSUS SHORT QUOTES IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: Short quotes (generally under 400 words or fewer than five lines of prose) are integrated into the text with quotation marks. Block quotes, for longer quotations, are set off from the text with an indentation and do not use quotation marks. This distinction applies to how the quote appears in your text, but the bibliographic entry for the source remains consistent.

Q: HOW DO I CITE A QUOTE FROM A SOURCE I ONLY PARTIALLY READ OR SUMMARIZED FROM ANOTHER SOURCE?

A: Chicago style generally discourages citing sources you have not personally consulted. If you are quoting a source that was cited in another work (a secondary source), you should ideally find and cite the original source. If that is impossible, you would cite the secondary source and indicate that the quote was found within it, often using phrasing like "as quoted in..." in your note or text.

Q: WHAT ARE THE ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF A CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY FOR A QUOTE FROM A WEBPAGE?

A: FOR A WEBPAGE, ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS INCLUDE THE AUTHOR (IF KNOWN), THE TITLE OF THE SPECIFIC PAGE, THE TITLE OF THE WEBSITE, THE PUBLICATION OR MODIFICATION DATE (OR ACCESS DATE IF NO OTHER DATE IS AVAILABLE), AND THE URL. THE SPECIFIC PAGE NUMBER IS NOT APPLICABLE TO MOST WEBPAGES.

Q: CAN I USE ABBREVIATIONS IN MY CHICAGO STYLE NOTES FOR REPEATED CITATIONS OF THE SAME SOURCE?

A: YES, IN THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, AFTER THE FIRST FULL CITATION OF A SOURCE, SUBSEQUENT CITATIONS CAN USE A SHORTENED FORM, TYPICALLY CONSISTING OF THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE PAGE NUMBER (E.G., SMITH, BOOK TITLE, 45). IF THE SAME SOURCE IS CITED MULTIPLE TIMES CONSECUTIVELY, "IBID." CAN BE USED FOLLOWED BY THE PAGE NUMBER.

Q: WHAT IS THE CORRECT WAY TO HANDLE QUOTES THAT CONTAIN THEIR OWN INTERNAL QUOTES IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: IN CHICAGO STYLE, SINGLE QUOTATION MARKS ARE USED FOR QUOTES WITHIN QUOTES. FOR EXAMPLE: HE STATED, "SHE TOLD ME, 'I WILL BE THERE.'" THE CITATION WOULD FOLLOW THE SAME RULES AS FOR ANY OTHER DIRECT QUOTE.

Q: MY PROFESSOR SPECIFIED USING THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM FOR MY PAPER. DO I STILL NEED A BIBLIOGRAPHY?

A: YES, EVEN WHEN USING THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, A REFERENCE LIST (WHICH FUNCTIONS AS A BIBLIOGRAPHY) IS REQUIRED AT THE END OF YOUR PAPER. THIS LIST INCLUDES FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRIES FOR ALL SOURCES CITED IN THE TEXT, ALPHABETIZED BY AUTHOR'S LAST NAME.

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
