COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID

UNDERSTANDING CHICAGO STYLE FIGURE FORMATTING

CHICAGO STYLE, PARTICULARLY THE GUIDELINES OUTLINED IN THE *CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE* (CMOS), EMPHASIZES CLARITY AND ACCESSIBILITY WHEN INCORPORATING VISUAL ELEMENTS LIKE FIGURES INTO WRITTEN WORKS. PROPER FIGURE FORMATTING IN CHICAGO STYLE ENSURES THAT READERS CAN EASILY LOCATE, UNDERSTAND, AND VERIFY THE SOURCE OF ANY VISUAL INFORMATION PRESENTED. THIS INVOLVES A SYSTEMATIC APPROACH TO NUMBERING, LABELING, CAPTIONING, AND CITING THESE VISUAL AIDS, WHETHER THEY ARE PHOTOGRAPHS, CHARTS, GRAPHS, MAPS, OR ILLUSTRATIONS.

THE CORE PRINCIPLE BEHIND CHICAGO STYLE FIGURE FORMATTING IS TO PROVIDE READERS WITH ALL THE NECESSARY INFORMATION TO IDENTIFY AND UNDERSTAND THE FIGURE'S CONTENT AND ORIGIN WITHOUT DISRUPTING THE FLOW OF THE MAIN TEXT. THIS MEANS THAT FIGURES SHOULD BE DISTINCT, WELL-INTEGRATED, AND METICULOUSLY REFERENCED. IGNORING THESE GUIDELINES CAN LEAD TO CONFUSION, A PERCEIVED LACK OF PROFESSIONALISM, AND POTENTIAL ISSUES WITH ACADEMIC INTEGRITY.

ESSENTIAL COMPONENTS OF CHICAGO STYLE FIGURES

EVERY FIGURE PRESENTED IN CHICAGO STYLE ADHERES TO A SET OF FUNDAMENTAL COMPONENTS THAT WORK TOGETHER TO CREATE A COHERENT AND INFORMATIVE PRESENTATION. THESE COMPONENTS ARE NOT MERELY DECORATIVE; THEY SERVE SPECIFIC PURPOSES IN COMMUNICATING THE FIGURE'S CONTEXT AND ORIGIN TO THE READER.

FIGURE NUMBERING

CONSISTENT NUMBERING IS THE FIRST STEP IN ORGANIZING FIGURES WITHIN A DOCUMENT. IN CHICAGO STYLE, FIGURES ARE TYPICALLY NUMBERED SEQUENTIALLY THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRE DOCUMENT, REGARDLESS OF THEIR PLACEMENT WITHIN DIFFERENT CHAPTERS OR SECTIONS. THE NUMBERING SHOULD BE ARABIC (1, 2, 3, ETC.). FOR INSTANCE, THE FIRST FIGURE ENCOUNTERED IN THE MANUSCRIPT WILL BE "FIGURE 1," THE SECOND "FIGURE 2," AND SO ON. THIS SEQUENTIAL NUMBERING MAKES IT EASY FOR READERS TO REFER TO SPECIFIC FIGURES WHEN DISCUSSING THEM IN THE TEXT.

FIGURE LABELING

EACH FIGURE MUST BE CLEARLY LABELED WITH ITS CORRESPONDING NUMBER. THIS LABEL IS USUALLY PLACED ABOVE THE FIGURE ITSELF. THE FORMAT IS STRAIGHTFORWARD: "FIGURE" FOLLOWED BY THE ARABIC NUMERAL. FOR EXAMPLE, "FIGURE 1." THIS LABEL ACTS AS A PRIMARY IDENTIFIER FOR THE VISUAL ELEMENT AND IS THE KEY TO REFERENCING IT BOTH WITHIN THE TEXT AND IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY.

FIGURE CAPTIONS

A CAPTION IS A BRIEF BUT INFORMATIVE DESCRIPTION THAT ACCOMPANIES EACH FIGURE. THE CAPTION'S PRIMARY ROLE IS TO EXPLAIN WHAT THE FIGURE DEPICTS, PROVIDING ESSENTIAL CONTEXT AND DETAILS THAT MIGHT NOT BE IMMEDIATELY OBVIOUS FROM THE VISUAL ALONE. IT SHOULD BE CONCISE YET COMPREHENSIVE, ENABLING READERS TO GRASP THE FIGURE'S SIGNIFICANCE WITHOUT HAVING TO EXTENSIVELY CONSULT THE MAIN TEXT.

SOURCE ATTRIBUTION

PROPER CITATION OF THE SOURCE OF THE FIGURE IS PARAMOUNT IN CHICAGO STYLE. THIS INVOLVES CREDITING THE ORIGINAL CREATOR OR PUBLISHER OF THE VISUAL MATERIAL. THE SOURCE INFORMATION IS TYPICALLY INCLUDED WITHIN THE CAPTION OR AS A SEPARATE NOTE FOLLOWING THE CAPTION, DEPENDING ON THE COMPLEXITY OF THE SOURCE AND WHETHER THE FIGURE IS REPRODUCED OR ADAPTED.

NUMBERING AND LABELING FIGURES

THE SYSTEM FOR NUMBERING AND LABELING FIGURES IN CHICAGO STYLE IS DESIGNED FOR MAXIMUM CLARITY AND EASE OF REFERENCE. ADHERING TO THESE CONVENTIONS ENSURES THAT FIGURES ARE DISTINCT AND EASILY IDENTIFIABLE THROUGHOUT YOUR DOCUMENT.

SEQUENTIAL ARABIC NUMERALS

AS PREVIOUSLY MENTIONED, FIGURES ARE ASSIGNED SEQUENTIAL ARABIC NUMERALS. THIS MEANS THAT IF YOU HAVE MULTIPLE FIGURES ACROSS DIFFERENT CHAPTERS, THEY WILL CONTINUE TO BE NUMBERED CONSECUTIVELY. FOR EXAMPLE, IF CHAPTER 1 CONTAINS FIGURES 1 THROUGH 5, CHAPTER 2 WILL BEGIN WITH FIGURE 6. THIS CONSISTENT NUMBERING SCHEME PREVENTS AMBIGUITY AND SIMPLIFIES CROSS-REFERENCING.

PLACEMENT OF LABELS

THE FIGURE LABEL, "FIGURE [NUMBER]," IS TYPICALLY PLACED PROMINENTLY ABOVE THE VISUAL ELEMENT. THIS ENSURES THAT IT IS IMMEDIATELY VISIBLE AND ASSOCIATED WITH THE CORRECT IMAGE, CHART, OR GRAPH. THE LABEL SHOULD BE CLEAR AND LEGIBLE, USING THE SAME FONT STYLE AND SIZE AS THE MAIN TEXT, OR A SLIGHTLY BOLDER VARIATION FOR EMPHASIS.

CRAFTING EFFECTIVE FIGURE CAPTIONS

THE FIGURE CAPTION IS MORE THAN JUST A LABEL; IT IS A CRITICAL PIECE OF INFORMATION THAT BRIDGES THE VISUAL ELEMENT AND THE SURROUNDING TEXT. A WELL-WRITTEN CAPTION ENHANCES UNDERSTANDING AND FULFILLS THE REQUIREMENTS OF CHICAGO STYLE.

CONTENT OF A CAPTION

A COMPREHENSIVE CAPTION SHOULD INCLUDE SEVERAL KEY ELEMENTS. FIRST, IT MUST CLEARLY IDENTIFY THE FIGURE USING ITS NUMBER, E.G., "FIGURE 1." SECOND, IT NEEDS TO PROVIDE A CONCISE DESCRIPTION OF WHAT THE FIGURE ILLUSTRATES. THIS DESCRIPTION SHOULD BE FACTUAL AND OBJECTIVE. IF THE FIGURE IS A GRAPH, IT SHOULD EXPLAIN WHAT THE AXES REPRESENT AND WHAT TRENDS ARE BEING SHOWN. IF IT'S A PHOTOGRAPH, IT SHOULD IDENTIFY THE SUBJECT AND ITS SIGNIFICANCE. FOR CHARTS OR DIAGRAMS, THE CAPTION SHOULD CLARIFY THE DATA OR PROCESS BEING DEPICTED.

INCLUDING SOURCE INFORMATION WITHIN THE CAPTION

FOR FIGURES THAT ARE REPRODUCED OR ADAPTED FROM EXISTING SOURCES, THE CAPTION MUST INCLUDE THE NECESSARY CITATION INFORMATION. THIS IS OFTEN PRESENTED IN A SHORTENED FORM WITHIN THE CAPTION ITSELF, FOLLOWED BY A FULL CITATION IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY. FOR EXAMPLE, A CAPTION MIGHT READ: "FIGURE 3. AVERAGE DAILY TEMPERATURE IN CHICAGO, 1990-2020. (SOURCE: NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION, 2021)." THE PRECISE FORMAT FOR SOURCE ATTRIBUTION WITHIN THE CAPTION CAN VARY SLIGHTLY BASED ON THE ORIGINAL SOURCE TYPE AND WHETHER IT IS A DIRECT REPRODUCTION OR AN ADAPTATION.

WHEN TO USE A NOTE BELOW THE CAPTION

IN SOME INSTANCES, PARTICULARLY WHEN A FIGURE IS COMPLEX OR REQUIRES EXTENSIVE EXPLANATORY NOTES REGARDING METHODOLOGY, DEFINITIONS, OR ABBREVIATIONS, IT MAY BE BENEFICIAL TO INCLUDE A NOTE DIRECTLY BELOW THE CAPTION. THIS NOTE PROVIDES ADDITIONAL DETAIL THAT MIGHT OTHERWISE CLUTTER THE MAIN CAPTION. THE NOTE SHOULD BE CLEARLY MARKED, OFTEN WITH "NOTE:" OR "SOURCE:" FOLLOWED BY THE RELEVANT INFORMATION. THIS ALLOWS FOR A MORE DETAILED EXPLANATION WITHOUT OVERWHELMING THE READER.

IN-TEXT CITATIONS FOR FIGURES

JUST AS WITH ANY OTHER SOURCE MATERIAL, FIGURES THAT ARE NOT YOUR OWN ORIGINAL WORK REQUIRE PROPER IN-TEXT CITATION WITHIN THE BODY OF YOUR WRITING. THIS DIRECTS YOUR READERS TO THE ORIGIN OF THE VISUAL INFORMATION YOU ARE PRESENTING.

REFERENCING FIGURES IN THE TEXT

WHEN YOU MENTION A FIGURE IN YOUR NARRATIVE, YOU MUST REFER TO IT BY ITS NUMBER. FOR EXAMPLE, YOU WOULD WRITE: "AS SHOWN IN FIGURE 2, THE TREND INDICATES A SIGNIFICANT INCREASE..." OR "THIS PHENOMENON IS FURTHER ILLUSTRATED IN FIGURE 5." THIS DIRECT REFERENCE IS CRUCIAL FOR GUIDING YOUR READERS TO THE VISUAL AID YOU ARE DISCUSSING AND HELPS THEM TO BETTER UNDERSTAND YOUR ARGUMENT OR EXPLANATION.

LINKAGE BETWEEN TEXT AND FIGURE

THE GOAL OF IN-TEXT CITATION FOR FIGURES IS TO CREATE A SEAMLESS LINK BETWEEN YOUR DISCUSSION AND THE VISUAL REPRESENTATION. ENSURE THAT YOUR TEXTUAL DISCUSSION DIRECTLY RELATES TO THE CONTENT OF THE FIGURE YOU ARE REFERENCING. THE TEXT SHOULD GUIDE THE READER'S INTERPRETATION OF THE FIGURE, AND THE FIGURE SHOULD PROVIDE EVIDENCE OR ILLUSTRATION FOR YOUR TEXTUAL POINTS.

BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES FOR FIGURES

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY, OR REFERENCE LIST, IS WHERE YOU PROVIDE FULL, DETAILED INFORMATION FOR ALL THE SOURCES YOU HAVE CITED IN YOUR WORK, INCLUDING THE SOURCES OF YOUR FIGURES. THIS ALLOWS READERS TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL WORKS IF

THEY WISH TO EXPLORE THE INFORMATION FURTHER.

GENERAL PRINCIPLES FOR BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES

THE FORMAT OF A BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY FOR A FIGURE WILL DEPEND ON THE TYPE OF SOURCE THE FIGURE ORIGINATES FROM. THE CORE PRINCIPLE IS TO PROVIDE ENOUGH INFORMATION FOR A READER TO IDENTIFY AND RETRIEVE THE ORIGINAL SOURCE. THIS TYPICALLY INCLUDES AUTHOR (IF APPLICABLE), TITLE OF THE LARGER WORK (BOOK, JOURNAL, WEBSITE), PUBLICATION DETAILS (PUBLISHER, YEAR, PAGE NUMBERS), AND ANY SPECIFIC IDENTIFIERS LIKE A DOI OR URL.

EXAMPLES OF BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES

HERE ARE SOME EXAMPLES OF HOW YOU MIGHT CITE FIGURES FROM DIFFERENT SOURCES IN YOUR BIBLIOGRAPHY:

- **FOR A FIGURE FROM A BOOK:** AUTHOR, A. A. (YEAR). TITLE OF BOOK. PUBLISHER. PAGE NUMBER(S) WHERE FIGURE APPEARS.
- **FOR A FIGURE FROM A JOURNAL ARTICLE:** AUTHOR, A. A., & AUTHOR, B. B. (YEAR). TITLE OF ARTICLE. TITLE OF JOURNAL, VOLUME(ISSUE), PAGE NUMBERS. DOI OR URL.
- **FOR A FIGURE FROM A WEBSITE:** AUTHOR, A. A. (YEAR, MONTH DATE). TITLE OF WEB PAGE. WEBSITE NAME. URL.

WHEN THE FIGURE IS SPECIFICALLY CREDITED TO AN INDIVIDUAL RATHER THAN A PUBLICATION, THEIR NAME WOULD APPEAR AS THE AUTHOR. FOR FIGURES FOUND IN A REPORT OR OTHER INSTITUTIONAL PUBLICATION, THE INSTITUTION OFTEN SERVES AS THE AUTHOR.

SPECIFIC FIGURE TYPE CONSIDERATIONS

WHILE THE GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF CHICAGO STYLE FIGURE FORMATTING REMAIN CONSISTENT, CERTAIN TYPES OF FIGURES MAY REQUIRE MINOR ADJUSTMENTS TO THEIR PRESENTATION AND CITATION.

CHARTS AND GRAPHS

FOR CHARTS AND GRAPHS, IT IS ESSENTIAL THAT THE CAPTION CLEARLY EXPLAINS THE VARIABLES PLOTTED ON THE AXES AND THE UNITS OF MEASUREMENT. ANY LEGENDS OR KEYS WITHIN THE CHART SHOULD BE EASILY UNDERSTANDABLE OR EXPLAINED IN THE CAPTION OR A NOTE. IF YOU HAVE CREATED THE CHART OR GRAPH YOURSELF FROM RAW DATA, YOU SHOULD STILL CITE THE SOURCE OF THAT DATA IN YOUR CAPTION AND BIBLIOGRAPHY.

PHOTOGRAPHS AND ILLUSTRATIONS

WHEN USING PHOTOGRAPHS OR ILLUSTRATIONS, THE CAPTION SHOULD IDENTIFY THE SUBJECT MATTER AND PROVIDE ANY RELEVANT CONTEXT. IF THE PHOTOGRAPH WAS TAKEN BY YOU OR IS FROM A PERSONAL COLLECTION, YOU CAN STATE THIS. IF IT'S A COPYRIGHTED IMAGE, YOU MUST OBTAIN PERMISSION AND PROVIDE THE NECESSARY CITATION INFORMATION. FOR HISTORICAL PHOTOGRAPHS, THE ARCHIVAL SOURCE SHOULD BE CLEARLY INDICATED.

MAPS AND DIAGRAMS

MAPS AND DIAGRAMS, LIKE CHARTS, NEED CLEAR LABELING OF ELEMENTS AND CONTEXT. THE CAPTION SHOULD EXPLAIN WHAT THE MAP OR DIAGRAM IS REPRESENTING AND ANY KEY FEATURES OR SYMBOLS USED. FOR MAPS, GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION AND SCALE ARE OFTEN IMPORTANT DETAILS TO INCLUDE IN THE CAPTION OR A NOTE.

BEST PRACTICES FOR CLARITY AND PROFESSIONALISM

BEYOND THE SPECIFIC RULES, ADOPTING BEST PRACTICES ENSURES THAT YOUR FIGURES ARE NOT ONLY COMPLIANT WITH CHICAGO STYLE BUT ALSO MAXIMALLY EFFECTIVE IN COMMUNICATING YOUR MESSAGE.

VISUAL CLARITY AND QUALITY

ENSURE THAT ALL FIGURES ARE OF HIGH RESOLUTION AND CLEARLY LEGIBLE. POOR QUALITY IMAGES OR TEXT THAT IS TOO SMALL TO READ DETRACTS SIGNIFICANTLY FROM THE READER'S EXPERIENCE AND CAN UNDERMINE THE CREDIBILITY OF YOUR WORK. FIGURES SHOULD BE FREE OF VISUAL CLUTTER THAT MIGHT OBSCURE THE MAIN POINT.

INTEGRATION WITH TEXT

FIGURES SHOULD BE PLACED AS CLOSE AS POSSIBLE TO WHERE THEY ARE FIRST MENTIONED IN THE TEXT. THIS PROXIMITY HELPS READERS TO EASILY REFER TO THE VISUAL WHILE READING THE RELEVANT DISCUSSION. AVOID PLACING FIGURES TOO FAR FROM THEIR INITIAL REFERENCE.

CONSISTENCY

MAINTAIN A CONSISTENT STYLE FOR ALL YOUR FIGURES THROUGHOUT THE DOCUMENT. THIS INCLUDES FONT CHOICES, LABELING CONVENTIONS, AND CAPTION FORMATTING. CONSISTENCY REINFORCES THE PROFESSIONAL APPEARANCE OF YOUR WORK AND MAKES IT EASIER FOR READERS TO NAVIGATE.

COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID

EVEN WITH CAREFUL ATTENTION, WRITERS CAN SOMETIMES STUMBLE OVER COMMON ERRORS IN FIGURE FORMATTING AND CITATION.

- **IGNORING SOURCE ATTRIBUTION:** FAILING TO CITE THE SOURCE OF A FIGURE IS A COMMON OVERSIGHT AND A VIOLATION OF ACADEMIC INTEGRITY.
- **AMBIGUOUS CAPTIONS:** CAPTIONS THAT ARE TOO VAGUE OR DO NOT ADEQUATELY EXPLAIN THE FIGURE CAN LEAVE READERS CONFUSED.
- **INCONSISTENT NUMBERING:** SKIPPING NUMBERS OR RESTARTING NUMBERING INCORRECTLY CAN CREATE SIGNIFICANT CONFUSION.
- **POOR QUALITY IMAGES:** USING LOW-RESOLUTION OR PIXELATED IMAGES MAKES FIGURES DIFFICULT TO INTERPRET.
- **MISPLACEMENT:** PLACING FIGURES TOO FAR FROM THEIR FIRST MENTION IN THE TEXT BREAKS THE READER'S FLOW.

BY BEING AWARE OF THESE COMMON ERRORS AND DILIGENTLY FOLLOWING THE GUIDELINES, YOU CAN ENSURE YOUR CHICAGO STYLE FIGURE FORMATTING IS ACCURATE AND EFFECTIVE.

Q: WHAT IS THE PRIMARY PURPOSE OF FIGURE FORMATTING IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: THE PRIMARY PURPOSE OF FIGURE FORMATTING IN CHICAGO STYLE IS TO ENSURE CLARITY, CONSISTENCY, AND PROPER ATTRIBUTION OF VISUAL ELEMENTS WITHIN A DOCUMENT, ALLOWING READERS TO EASILY LOCATE, UNDERSTAND, AND VERIFY THE SOURCE OF INFORMATION PRESENTED VISUALLY.

A: A NOTE BELOW A FIGURE CAPTION IS APPROPRIATE FOR PROVIDING ADDITIONAL, DETAILED EXPLANATIONS ABOUT THE FIGURE'S CONTENT, METHODOLOGY, DEFINITIONS, OR ABBREVIATIONS THAT WOULD OTHERWISE CLUTTER THE MAIN CAPTION.

Q: HOW DO I CITE A FIGURE FROM A BOOK IN MY CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHY?

A: TO CITE A FIGURE FROM A BOOK IN YOUR CHICAGO STYLE BIBLIOGRAPHY, YOU WOULD TYPICALLY INCLUDE THE AUTHOR, YEAR, TITLE OF THE BOOK, PUBLISHER, AND THE PAGE NUMBER(S) WHERE THE FIGURE APPEARS.

Q: WHAT ARE THE BEST PRACTICES FOR ENSURING VISUAL CLARITY OF FIGURES IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: BEST PRACTICES FOR VISUAL CLARITY INCLUDE USING HIGH-RESOLUTION IMAGES, ENSURING LEGIBLE TEXT, AVOIDING VISUAL CLUTTER, AND MAINTAINING CONSISTENT FORMATTING ACROSS ALL FIGURES.

Q: IS IT NECESSARY TO CITE FIGURES THAT I CREATE MYSELF?

A: EVEN IF YOU CREATE A FIGURE YOURSELF, YOU MUST CITE THE SOURCE OF THE ORIGINAL DATA USED TO CREATE THAT FIGURE IN YOUR CAPTION AND BIBLIOGRAPHY.

Q: WHAT IS A COMMON PITFALL REGARDING FIGURE CAPTIONS?

A: A COMMON PITFALL REGARDING FIGURE CAPTIONS IS CREATING CAPTIONS THAT ARE TOO VAGUE OR DO NOT ADEQUATELY EXPLAIN THE FIGURE'S CONTENT, LEADING TO READER CONFUSION.

Q: HOW DOES CHICAGO STYLE HANDLE ADAPTED FIGURES VERSUS REPRODUCED FIGURES IN CAPTIONS?

A: FOR BOTH REPRODUCED AND ADAPTED FIGURES, CHICAGO STYLE REQUIRES CLEAR SOURCE ATTRIBUTION WITHIN THE CAPTION OR A NOTE. THE SPECIFIC WORDING MAY SLIGHTLY DIFFER TO INDICATE WHETHER THE FIGURE IS AN EXACT REPRODUCTION OR AN ADAPTATION OF AN ORIGINAL WORK.
