THESE PHRASES ARE ESSENTIAL FOR ANALYTICAL AND ARGUMENTATIVE WRITING, DEMONSTRATING A CHAIN OF REASONING.

EXEMPLIFICATION TRANSITIONS

THEY SIGNAL THAT SPECIFIC INSTANCES ARE ABOUT TO BE PRESENTED TO CLARIFY, SUPPORT, OR ELABORATE ON A PRECEDING STATEMENT, MAKING ABSTRACT IDEAS MORE TANGIBLE AND UNDERSTANDABLE FOR THE READER.

STRATEGIC PLACEMENT AND USAGE OF TRANSITION PHRASES

BEGINNING OF A PARAGRAPH

THE NUANCES OF ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL WRITING

A: ADDITIVE TRANSITION PHRASES (E.G., "FURTHERMORE," "IN ADDITION") INTRODUCE ADDITIONAL, SUPPORTING INFORMATION, WHILE CONTRASTIVE TRANSITION PHRASES (E.G., "HOWEVER," "IN CONTRAST") SIGNAL A DIFFERENCE OR OPPOSITION BETWEEN IDEAS. BOTH ARE ESSENTIAL FOR BUILDING A WELL-ROUNDED ARGUMENT.

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
