This is appended after the year, separated by a comma. For example, a direct quote might be cited as (Doe 2023, 45). If referencing a

FOR TWO AUTHORS, BOTH NAMES ARE INCLUDED, JOINED BY "AND" (SMITH AND JONES 2022).

WHEN TO USE PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS IN CHICAGO STYLE

PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS ARE EMPLOYED WHENEVER YOU REFER TO, QUOTE, PARAPHRASE, SUMMARIZE, OR OTHERWISE INCORPORATE INFORMATION OR IDEAS FROM AN EXTERNAL SOURCE INTO YOUR WRITING. THIS INCLUDES DIRECT QUOTATIONS, WHERE YOU USE THE AUTHOR'S EXACT WORDS, AND PARAPHRASES, WHERE YOU REPHRASE THE AUTHOR'S IDEAS IN YOUR OWN WORDS. EVEN WHEN SUMMARIZING A LARGER SECTION OF AN AUTHOR'S WORK, A PARENTHETICAL CITATION IS NECESSARY.

THE FUNDAMENTAL RULE IS TO CITE ANY INFORMATION THAT IS NOT COMMON KNOWLEDGE OR YOUR OWN ORIGINAL THOUGHT. THIS PROACTIVE APPROACH TO CITATION PREVENTS PLAGIARISM AND DEMONSTRATES YOUR COMMITMENT TO SCHOLARLY ETHICS. THE PARENTHETICAL CITATION SHOULD APPEAR IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE INFORMATION IT REFERS TO, TYPICALLY BEFORE THE PUNCTUATION MARK THAT ENDS THE SENTENCE OR CLAUSE. PROPER PLACEMENT ENSURES THAT THE READER UNDERSTANDS EXACTLY WHICH PART OF YOUR TEXT IS SUPPORTED BY A PARTICULAR SOURCE.

COMMON SOURCE TYPES AND THEIR PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS

FOR BOOKS, THE STANDARD AUTHOR-DATE FORMAT IS THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION. IF YOU ARE CITING A SPECIFIC PASSAGE, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE PAGE NUMBER.

- PARAPHRASE: (SMITH 2021)
- DIRECT QUOTE: (SMITH 2021, 112)
- TWO AUTHORS: (SMITH AND JONES 2020)
- THREE OR MORE AUTHORS: (SMITH ET AL. 2019)

JOURNAL ARTICLES

CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES FOLLOWS A SIMILAR PATTERN, GENERALLY INCLUDING THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE PUBLICATION YEAR. PAGE NUMBERS ARE ESSENTIAL FOR DIRECT QUOTES OR SPECIFIC PARAPHRASES.

WEBSITES AND ONLINE ARTICLES

WHEN CITING ONLINE ARTICLES OR WEB PAGES, THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME (IF AVAILABLE) AND THE PUBLICATION YEAR ARE USED. IF NO AUTHOR IS LISTED, THE TITLE OF THE ARTICLE OR WEBSITE MAY BE USED IN PLACE OF THE AUTHOR'S NAME. MANY ONLINE ARTICLES LACK PAGE NUMBERS, SO THIS ELEMENT MIGHT BE OMITTED. HOWEVER, IF THE WEBSITE USES A NUMBERING SYSTEM (E.G., SECTION NUMBERS), THOSE CAN BE INCLUDED.

OTHER ONLINE RESOURCES

FOR OTHER ONLINE RESOURCES LIKE BLOG POSTS, REPORTS, OR MULTIMEDIA, THE PRINCIPLE REMAINS THE SAME: IDENTIFY THE AUTHOR AND PUBLICATION DATE. IF AN AUTHOR IS NOT CLEARLY DESIGNATED, USE THE NAME OF THE ORGANIZATION OR A DESCRIPTIVE TITLE. FOR RESOURCES WITHOUT A CLEAR PUBLICATION DATE, YOU MAY USE "N.D." (NO DATE), THOUGH IT'S GENERALLY PREFERABLE TO FIND A DATE IF POSSIBLE.

- BLOG POST WITH AUTHOR: (LEE 2023)

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS AND THE BIBLIOGRAPHY

A: FOR TRANSLATED WORKS, YOU GENERALLY CITE THE ORIGINAL AUTHOR AND YEAR OF ORIGINAL PUBLICATION. IF YOU ARE QUOTING FROM THE TRANSLATED EDITION, YOU WOULD INCLUDE THE TRANSLATOR'S NAME AND PAGE NUMBER IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY, BUT THE PARENTHETICAL CITATION TYPICALLY REMAINS (ORIGINAL AUTHOR YEAR).

Q: WHAT DOES "ET AL." MEAN IN A CHICAGO STYLE PARENTHETICAL CITATION?
