not include a framework for multiparty elections in the Western sense.

The Future of Parliamentary Elections Under Taliban Rule

The future of parliamentary elections in Afghanistan under Taliban rule remains highly uncertain and, by most accounts, unlikely in the near to medium term. The Taliban have established an interim government that does not include a representative legislative body elected through a democratic process. Their focus has been on consolidating power and imposing their governance framework, which prioritizes their ideological principles over democratic participation.

While the Taliban have occasionally spoken of reforms or the possibility of a consultative council, there is no indication that they intend to hold parliamentary elections that would involve free competition, universal suffrage, and independent oversight in line with international democratic norms. For the U.S. and the international community, the primary concern is the humanitarian situation and the need to prevent Afghanistan from becoming a safe haven for terrorist groups. The pursuit of democratic elections, therefore, has taken a backseat to these more immediate security and humanitarian priorities. Any future electoral processes that might occur would likely be dictated by the internal political dynamics of the Taliban regime and their approach to governance, rather than by external democratic blueprints.

It analyzes how U.S. support and involvement shaped the composition and function of these legislative bodies. The book examines the extent to which the elections successfully established a representative and effective government. It also considers the long-term sustainability of these democratic institutions without continued significant external support.

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
