US influence, while no longer military, continues to be felt through diplomatic engagement, humanitarian aid, and the broader international community's efforts to promote stability and prevent Afghanistan from becoming a haven for terrorism. However, the leverage available to the US and its allies is significantly different from when a substantial military presence was in place.

The international community is cautiously observing the situation, with a focus on human rights, counter-terrorism, and humanitarian concerns. The long-term stability and security of Afghanistan will depend on a complex interplay of internal governance, regional dynamics, and the international community's sustained, albeit altered, engagement.
